- 1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Mr Speaker (the Honourable Dr H. A. Jenkins) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 ADDRESS IN REPLY TO THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the following Address in Reply to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor-General be agreed to: MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Australia, in Parliament assembled, desire to express our loyalty to our Most Gracious Sovereign, and to thank Your Excellency for the Speech which you have been pleased to address to Parliament—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Sinclair (Leader of the National Party of Australia), viz.—That the following words be added to the Address:

"; but the House is of the opinion that the Government's program outlined in the Speech fails to address critical problems facing Australia in that—

- (1) it fails to reassure the Australian people that the country's defence arrangements within the Western Alliance will be preserved and strengthened following—
 - (a) the Prime Minister's capitulation to internal party pressures on the issue of Australia providing logistical assistance to the US for its testing of the MX missile, and
 - (b) increasing uncertainty as to the future of the ANZUS Treaty fuelled by members of the Labor Government, including a Cabinet Minister;
- (2) it contains no coherent economic strategy at a time when recovery is threatened by—
 - (a) record government taxation and spending;
 - (b) continuing pressure within the Government for new taxes on assets;
 - (c) growing demands for higher wages and other extra cost burdens on industry;
 - (d) the level of public debt repayments, and
 - (e) loss of value of the currency reflecting world concern about Australia's competitiveness and government instability, and
- (3) it endorses a rigid, centralised wage determining structure which imposes the same cost burdens on commerce and industry regardless of ability to pay"-

Debate resumed.

10 NORTHERN TERRITORY—COMMENTS BY MINISTER FOR ABORIGINAL AFFAIRS—STATEMENT BY MEMBER: Mr Everingham, by leave, made a statement concerning remarks made by the Minister for Aboriginal Affairs in the House on 21 March 1985.

Paper: Mr Everingham, by leave, presented the following paper:

Mr E. C. Cameron and Mr Shipton—from certain citizens praying that the national flag not be changed except by a referendum.

Mr E. C. Cameron and Mr Drummond-from certain citizens in similar terms.

- Mr Drummond and Mr Rocher—from certain citizens praying that the existing national flag remain sacrosanct.
- Mr Baldwin—from certain citizens praying that there be no increase in State aid to private schools and that the primary obligation to government schools be re-affirmed.
- Mr D. M. Cameron—from certain residents of Queensland praying that no action be taken to change the national flag.
- Mr E. C. Cameron—from certain citizens praying that certain action be taken against the importation and distribution of pornographic and obscene materials.
- Mr E. C. Cameron—from certain citizens praying that the term of the Costigan Commission be extended, all necessary resources be provided to enable it to conclude its investigations and Parliament not be dissolved until its report has been fully debated by both Houses.
- Mr E. C. Cameron—from certain residents of the Division of Indi praying that young Australians who have undertaken employment while at school be eligible for Tertiary Education Assistance allowances.
- Mr Holding—from certain citizens praying that the export of koalas be discontinued, their habitats be revegetated and funding be made available for research into koala diseases.
- Mr Kerin—from certain citizens praying that any attempt to re-introduce tertiary fees be rejected.
- Mr Millar—from certain citizens praying that certain allowances and privileges granted to de facto spouses of Parliamentarians and to homosexual partners of ABC employees be withdrawn and that the position of the traditional family unit be consolidated.
- Mr Milton—from certain citizens praying that the Government support the stand taken by the New Zealand Government on nuclear vessels and that the policy of developing zones of peace and nuclear free zones in the Indian and Pacific Oceans be implemented.
- Mr Wilson—from certain residents of South Australia praying that the slaughter of brumbies in North Queensland be stopped or that it be carried out in a humane manner.

- 13 AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF ABORIGINAL STUDIES COUNCIL: Mr Young (Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Australian Institute of Aboriginal Studies Act 1964*, this House appoints Mr Gayler and Mr Shipton to be members of the Council of the Australian Institute of Aboriginal Studies, and to continue as members until the dissolution of the 34th Parliament.
