Debate resumed by Mr Hunt (Deputy Leader of the National Party of Australia) who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House is of the opinion that inadequate consultation has taken place with the export industries concerned to ensure that the most efficient and cost-effective export inspection system is adopted".

- 24 APPROPRIATION BILL (NO. 1) 1985-86-BUDGET DEBATE: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Peacock, viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "the House condemns the Budget because—
  (1) it is only half a Budget which fails to outline any approach to the urgent
  - problems of tax reform and tax relief;
  - (2) it fails to remove the threat of new taxes on investment and jobs, such as a capital gains tax which will include death duties and gift taxes;
  - (3) it condemns 750 000 Australians to higher marginal tax brackets during the
  - (4) it fails to address the fundamental problems facing the Australian economy, particularly high inflation, the lack of international competitiveness and the need for further cuts in Government spending;
  - (5) it fails to provide clear direction on the Government's approach to discounting wage indexation for the effects of depreciation of the dollar and so potentially destroys its employment benefits;
  - (6) it fails to move towards the deregulation of labour markets required to give all Australians the chance for a job, and
  - (7) it burdens Australia with the threat of continued high interest rates which hurt not only homebuyers but hit business investment and jobs"-

Debate resumed.
