8 **DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—MINISTERIAL RESPONSIBILITY—PRIME MINISTER AND THE AUSTRALIAN BICENTENNIAL AUTHORITY:** The House was informed that Mr Howard (Leader of the Opposition) had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The implications for the principle of ministerial responsibility arising out of the Prime Minister's handling of the \$500 000 payment to the former Chief Executive of the Australian Bicentennial Authority".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Howard addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

 from certain citizens praying that all federal funding to children's services be restored.

Mr Beddall, Mr Dobie, Mr Price and Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that there be no taxation on illness and no special taxation on those who seek to insure themselves against the cost of private health care.

Mr Beale, Mr Halverson and Mr Shipton—from certain citizens praying that the national flag not be changed except by a referendum.

Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens in similar terms to the last preceding petition.

Mr Hollis and Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that 1989 be proposed as the International Year for Repairing the Earth and certain other action be taken in support of world peace.

Mr Staples and Mr Tickner—from certain citizens in similar terms to the last preceding petition.

Mr Kent and Mr Staples—from certain citizens praying that the Government support the stand taken by the New Zealand Government on nuclear vessels and that the policy of developing zones of peace and nuclear free zones in the Indian and Pacific Oceans be implemented.

- Mr Milton and Mr Staples—from certain citizens praying that any proposal to legislate for the establishment of plant variety rights in Australia be rejected.
- Mr Blunt—from certain citizens praying that all changes to benefits for veterans and conditions of service for military personnel announced in the May Economic Statement be withdrawn.
- Mr Braithwaite—from certain citizens praying that urgent financial assistance be provided to the sugar industry.
- Mr Cross—from certain citizens praying that the Special Broadcasting Service be maintained as the funding authority for public ethnic broadcasting until all ethnic broadcasters can propose another solution.
- Mr Grace—from certain residents of New South Wales praying that no airport be built at Badgery's Creek, NSW, and surrounding districts.
- Mr Hollis—from certain citizens praying that efforts for nuclear disarmament be intensified, US military bases on Australian soil be removed and the Pacific and Indian Oceans be kept nuclear free.
- Mr Kent—from certain citizens praying that the decision to close the Enterprise Migrant Hostel, Vic., be reversed.
- Mr Nehl—from certain citizens praying that any proposal to increase the burden of capital gains and wealth taxes be rejected.
- Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that the European Parliament's resolution in respect of the Baltic States be supported.
- Mr Ruddock—from certain citizens praying that the right to work be acknowledged and protected and that certain other action be taken to protect workers.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher in similar terms to the last preceding petition.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that the Government reconsider the assets test.
- Mr Slipper—from certain residents of the Division of Fisher praying that the existing national flag remain sacrosanct.
- Mr Staples—from certain citizens praying that compulsory identity cards not be introduced.

Debate adjourned (Mr Moore), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

- 15 **AUSTRALIAN TRADE COMMISSION (TRANSITIONAL PROVISIONS AND CONSEQUENTIAL AMENDMENTS) BILL 1985:** Mr Dawkins (Minister for Trade), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to repeal certain Acts, to enact certain transitional provisions, to make certain amendments in consequence of the enactment of the *Australian Trade Commission Act 1985*, and for related purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Dawkins moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Mr Moore), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
