9 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS SYSTEM: The House was informed that Mr Howard (Leader of the Opposition) had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The urgent need in Australia for an industrial relations system which makes all parties equal before the law and provides incentives for enterprise-based productivity gains".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

10 PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE: Mr Jones (Minister for Science), by leave, moved—That Mr Rocher be discharged from attendance on the Joint Committee of Public Accounts and that, in his place, Dr Watson be appointed a member of the committee.

Question-put and passed.

11 EXCISE TARIFF AND CUSTOMS TARIFF PROPOSALS: Mr Jones (Minister Assisting the Minister for Industry, Technology and Commerce) moved—

Excise Tariff Proposals No. 10 (1986), and

Customs Tariff Proposals Nos. 15 and 16 (1986).

Debate adjourned (Mr Sinclair—Leader of the National Party of Australia), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

12 SUPERANNUATION AND OTHER BENEFITS LEGISLATION AMENDMENT BILL 1986: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Sinclair (Leader of the National Party of Australia) who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House—

- (1) expresses its concern that the level of discounting of superannuation, Defence Forces Retirement Benefits (DFRB) and Defence Force Retirement and Death Benefits (DFRDB) pensions imposed by the legislation has not yet been proposed in a National Wage Case, let alone given effect by a decision of the Australian Conciliation and Arbitration Commission, and notes that—
 - (a) the Bill imposes on Commonwealth superannuitants, without consultation, a burden greater than that proposed for the community generally, in that it will come into effect before equivalent discounting of wages is even considered:
 - (b) discounting of DFRB and DFRDB pensions further erodes conditions of service in the Australian Defence Force (ADF) at a time when ADF resignations are at near-crisis level, and
 - (c) the Bill breaks, for the second time, Labor's 1983 election promise not to cut DFRB and DFRDB benefits, and
- (2) further calls on the Government to direct the Defence Force Remuneration Tribunal, as a matter of urgency, to inquire into the adequacy of pay and conditions of service in the ADF compared with those in the private sector and public service".

On the motion of Mr Hurford (Minister representing the Minister for Finance), the Bill was read a third time.

13 AUSTRALIAN LAND TRANSPORT (FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE) AMENDMENT BILL 1986: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Lloyd who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not opposing the passage of this Bill, the House condemns the Government for its disgraceful neglect of the nation's roads by—

- (1) being responsible for a dramatic fall in federal expenditure in real terms since 1983-84 from 2.12% of total budget outlays to 1.95% in 1984-85, and 1.78% in 1985-86 and an estimated 1.67% this financial year, as measured by the Australian Automobile Association;
- (2) retaining federal expenditure on roads at the same nominal level at \$1245 million for the third year in succession;
- (3) creating the dismal record of being responsible for the only 2 years since 1976-77 of not increasing federal road expenditure in nominal terms:
- (4) reducing the allocation to roads while at the same time increasing fuel excise tax by over 300% in 3 years of government;
- (5) artificially reducing the budget deficit by \$24 million and depriving the Australian Land Transport Program (ALTP) of this much needed finance, which has already been collected and allocated from fuel excise tax, and
- (6) generally abusing the trust fund principle for the ALTP and the Australian Bicentennial Road Development Trust Fund to cover the reduction in the Government's budgetary commitment to roads".

Debate continued.

Debate adjourned (Mr Lee), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.
