- 2 AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF ABORIGINAL STUDIES COUNCIL: Mr Young (Leader of the House), by leave, moved—That, in accordance with the provisions of the *Australian Institute of Aboriginal Studies Act 1964*, this House appoints Mr Gayler and Mr Miles to be members of the Council of the Australian Institute of Aboriginal Studies, and to continue as members until the dissolution of the 35th Parliament.

Question-put and passed.

3 STATES GRANTS (GENERAL REVENUE) AMENDMENT BILL 1987: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question— That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question-put and passed-Bill read a second time.

Message from the Administrator: Message No. 6, dated 15 September 1987, from His Excellency the Administrator was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

- On the motion of Mr P. F. Morris (Minister for Resources), the Bill was read a third time.
- 4 STATES (WORKS AND HOUSING) ASSISTANCE AMENDMENT BILL 1987: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—
  - Debate resumed by Mr Porter who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not opposing the provisions of the Bill, the House condemns the Government for the delay in the re-institution of negative gearing and for the pursuit of economic policies which have:
    - (a) forced a record number of over 161,000 Australians on to public housing lists;
    - (b) resulted in a long period of record high interest rates; and
    - (c) resulted last year in the lowest number of housing starts for the last 20 years excepting the drought year of 1982-83".
