MONDAY, 22 FEBRUARY 1988

- 1 The House met, at 2 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. Madam Speaker (the Honourable Joan Child) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 MINISTERIAL ARRANGEMENTS: Mr Hawke (Prime Minister) informed the House of the following ministerial arrangements during the respective absences abroad of Mr Bowen (Attorney-General) and Mr Duffy (Minister for Trade Negotiations):
 - Senator Tate (Minister for Justice) was acting as Attorney-General and would be represented in this House by Mr Holding (Minister for Immigration, Local Government and Ethnic Affairs); and
 - Senator Evans (Minister for Transport and Communications) was acting as Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade and would be represented in this House by Mr Beazley (Minister for Defence).
- 3 QUESTIONS: Questions without notice were asked.
- 4 SUSPENSION OF STANDING AND SESSIONAL ORDERS MOVED: Mr Howard (Leader of the Opposition) moved—That so much of the standing and sessional orders be suspended as would prevent the Prime Minister and the Member for Parramatta providing to the House forthwith a full explanation of the facts surrounding the resignation of the Member for Parramatta from the Ministry with particular reference to the Prime Minister's knowledge of the voting procedures for the theatre contract at Expo 88.

Debate ensued.

6 PETITIONS: The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:

Mr Beale, Mr Kent and Mr Milton—from certain citizens praying that importation of cobalt 60 and other radioactive substances be banned and regulations permitting irradiation of food in Australia be disallowed.

Mr Beale and Mr Lloyd—from certain citizens praying that certain action be taken in the ACT in relation to loitering, consumption of alcohol by under age persons and the production, sale and distribution of material depicting violence.

Mr Beale—from certain citizens praying that the legislation to tax fringe benefits not proceed.

Mr Beale—from certain citizens praying that all bans on smoking in the workplace and on domestic air travel be lifted and discriminatory smoking legislation not proceed.

Mr Braithwaite—from certain citizens praying that Telecom's proposal to time-charge local calls be rejected.

Mr T. A. Fischer, Mr Moore, Mr A. A. Morris, Mr Prosser, Mr Sciacca and Mr Shipton—from certain citizens; and Mr Fife—from certain residents of the Division of Hume, respectively, in similar terms to the last preceding petition.

Mr Chynoweth—from certain citizens praying that the national flag not be changed except by a referendum.

Mr Chynoweth—from certain citizens praying that any changes to the system of charging for local telephone calls not disadvantage the aged, infirm and other fixed income groups.

Mr Cobb—from certain citizens praying that the problems which identification cards are intended to reduce be attacked by other methods.

Mr Cobb—from certain citizens praying that the proposal for an identification card be rejected.

Mr Cobb—from certain residents of the Division of Parkes praying that any plans to conduct a wealth inquiry or impose new taxes be rejected.

- Mr A. A. Morris—from certain electors of the Division of Newcastle praying that a bilateral peace treaty containing certain proposals be offered to each nation-state.
- Mr Prosser—from certain citizens praying that the circulation of X-rated videos be prevented and laws regarding obscenity in the media be revived and enforced.
- Mr Shipton—from certain citizens praying that the closure of the Camberwell South post office, Vic., be prevented.

- 8 EMPLOYMENT, EDUCATION AND TRAINING—STANDING COMMITTEE: The House was informed that the National Party Whip had nominated Mr Cowan to be a member of the Standing Committee on Employment, Education and Training in place of Mr McVeigh.
- 9 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—RESIGNATION OF MEMBER FOR PARRAMATTA FROM MINISTRY: The House was informed that Mr Howard (Leader of the Opposition) had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The contempt shown to the Australian people by the Prime Minister and the Member for Parramatta through their failure to provide the Parliament with a full explanation of the facts surrounding the resignation of the Member for Parramatta from the Ministry".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Howard addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

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10 PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE—REPORTS: Mr Hollis (Chairman) presented the following reports from the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works:

- 11 COMMUNICATIONS LEGISLATION AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 2) 1987: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—
 That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Blunt, viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House:
 - (1) condemns the Government for its lack of action to date in abolishing a number of government-imposed constraints on Australia Post, Telecom Australia and the Overseas Telecommunications Commission including:
 - (a) unnecessary industrial relations co-ordination procedures which, in a number of cases, frustrate rather than expedite the resolution of particular industrial disputes;
 - (b) a costly and inflexible superannuation regime through the Commonwealth Superannuation Scheme which, in the case of Telecom, represents a 20% on-cost compared to an average cost of superannuation in the private sector of between 10 and 12%;
 - (c) restrictive borrowing limits which inhibit the raising of funds for capital works programs;
 - (d) cumbersome contracting and purchasing requirements, which, in the case of the latter, were recommended to be abolished by the Joint Committee of Public Accounts for Australia Post, Telecom Australia and the Overseas Telecommunications Commission; and
 - (e) constraints on new development initiatives such as joint ventures and subsidiary arrangements; and
 - (2) further condemns the Government for its shabby handling of the privatisation debate, which is highlighted by the current intense conflict within the Labor Party on this issue"—

Debate resumed.

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Holding (Minister for Immigration, Local Government and Ethnic Affairs), the Bill was read a third time.

12 COMMONWEALTH TEACHING SERVICE AMENDMENT BILL 1987: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—
That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

The House resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

In the committee

Bill, by leave, taken as a whole.

Mr Braithwaite, by leave, moved the following amendments together:

Clause 7-

Page 6, line 5, omit "Subject to subsection (2),".

Page 6, at end of proposed paragraph 32 (1) (b) add ", after consultation with the relevant staff organisation".

Page 6, proposed section 32, omit subsection (2).

Page 7, at the end of proposed section 33 add the following subsections:

- "'(6) A Joint Selection Committee shall not refuse to consider an application on the basis that the applicant is not a member of a relevant staff organisation.
- '(7) A Joint Selection Committee, or a member of a Joint Selection Committee, shall not, in assessing the claims of applicants in accordance with subsection (1), take into consideration whether an applicant is a member of a relevant staff organisation.".

Debate continued.

Amendments negatived.

Bill agreed to.

Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr Cowan reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Punch (Minister for the Arts and Territories), the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

13 AUSTRALIAN AIRLINES (CONVERSION TO PUBLIC COMPANY) BILL 1987: The order of the day having been read for the second reading—Mr Duncan (Minister for Employment and Education Services) moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Paper: Mr Duncan presented an explanatory memorandum to the Bill.

Mr Beale moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House condemns the Government for:

- (1) its double standards in introducing legislation similar to that which the previous coalition Government passed to convert the then Trans-Australia Airlines into a company and which this Government repealed;
- (2) its failure to take into account the recommendations of the Advisory Group on Australian Airlines' future capital requirements;
- (3) its failure to decide now whether or not to privatise Australian Airlines:
- (4) creating continuing unnecessary uncertainty among Australian Airlines' employees as to their future; and
- (5) the continuing poor administration of Australia's aviation infrastructure".

Debate continued.

Mr Jenkins addressing the House—

14 ADJOURNMENT: It being 10.15 p.m.—The question was proposed—That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at 10.54 p.m., adjourned until tomorrow at 2 p.m.
