- 3 EFFICIENCY AUDIT—REPORT OF AUDITOR-GENERAL—PUBLICATION OF PAPER: Madam Speaker presented the following paper:

- (1) That this House, in accordance with the provisions of the *Parliamentary Papers Act 1908*, authorises the publication of the Report of the Auditor-General, dated 18 April 1988, upon an efficiency audit of the Department of Defence: safety principles for explosives; and
- (2) That the report be printed.

4 WORLD TRADE AND THE GATT NEGOTIATIONS—MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—PAPER NOTED: Mr Duffy (Minister for Trade Negotiations), by leave, made a ministerial statement concerning world trade and the Uruguay round of GATT negotiations, and presented the following paper:

World trade and the GATT negotiations—Ministerial statement, 19 April 1988.

Mr Beazley (Leader of the House) moved—That the House take note of the paper.

Debate ensued.

Question-put and passed.

6 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—COMPULSORY UNIONISM: The House was informed that Mr Shack had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The

Hawke Labor Government's complete disregard for the freedom of Australian workers through its support of compulsory unionism".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr Shack addressed the House.

8 PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE—REPORT—STATEMENT BY MEMBER: Mr Tickner (Chairman) presented the following report from the Joint Committee of Public Accounts:

289th Report—Advance to the Minister for Finance.

Ordered to be printed.

Mr Tickner, by leave, made a statement in connection with the report.

9 APPROPRIATION BILL (NO. 3) 1987-88: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr Peacock (Deputy Leader of the Opposition), viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House notes that:

- (1) Budget estimates put Commonwealth Government outlays at over a quarter of Australia's GDP, and that this is funded by revenue collection that has made this the highest taxing Government in the post-war history of Australia;
- (2) the Government has increasingly burdened not only individuals but business with new incentive-sapping taxes like the fringe benefits tax and capital gains tax;
- (3) national productivity is not expected to rise much more than a dismal 0.5% during the course of 1987-88; and
- (4) without the incentive to invest and work productively, Australia will find it increasingly difficult to extricate itself from its \$87 billion foreign debt strait jacket without further reductions in our standard of living"—

Debate resumed.

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Jones (Minister for Science, Customs and Small Business), the Bill was read a third time.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.
