WEDNESDAY, 20 APRIL 1988

1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Madam Speaker (the Honourable Joan Child) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

2 **CRIMES (TORTURE) BILL 1988:** The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

*Paper:* Mr Bowen (Attorney-General), by leave, presented the following paper:

Convention against torture and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment adopted by the General Assembly of the United Nations on 10 December 1984—Table detailing countries participating, date of signature and ratification.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Bowen, the Bill was read a third time.

3 **NATIONAL COMPANIES AND SECURITIES COMMISSION AMENDMENT BILL 1988:** The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Moore who moved, as an amendment—That all words after “That” be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: “whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House is of the opinion that it is not appropriate to provide retrospective validation to certain directions by the National Companies and Securities Commission generally bestowing its powers and functions to be exercised by its Divisions which might otherwise be found to be invalid”.

Debate continued.

In accordance with the provisions of standing order 107, Madam Speaker had given priority to the matter proposed by Mr Carlton, namely, "The damage being caused to Australia's higher education system by the Hawke Government's corporate state approach to our universities and colleges".
