  - (4) when the process of aggregation has been completed, the Australian Broadcasting Tribunal conduct an inquiry into issuing new television licences in metropolitan markets, subject to a final decision being made by the Government"—

Debate resumed.

Mr O'Keefe was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed. Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

50 ADJOURNMENT: Mr Beazley (Leader of the House) moved—That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed. And then the House, at 11.15 p.m., adjourned until tomorrow at 10 a.m.
