- Debate resurred by Mr N. A. Brown who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, this House:
 - (1) notes that the Bill makes no provision in respect of the effective discrimination in so far as the provision of superannuation for part-time employees is concerned; and
 - (2) noting the urgent need to overcome the inequities, inadequacies and effective discrimination in existing superannuation arrangements, calls on the Government to introduce Retirement Savings Accounts as proposed in the

Opposition's Retirement Incomes Policy which is designed to ensure that all employees have an opportunity for access to superannuation cover".
