"PART 2A—AMENDMENT OF THE AUSTRALIAN PROTECTIVE SERVICE ACT 1987

Principal Act

"60A. In this Part, 'Principal Act' means the Australian Protective Service Act 1987.

Powers of arrest

"60B. Section 13 of the Principal Act is amended by omitting subparagraph (2) (a) (ii) and substituting the following subparagraph:

"(ii) the Crimes (Aircraft) Act 1963, the Crimes (Hijacking of Aircraft) Act 1972, the Crimes (Internationally Protected Persons) Act 1976 or the Crimes (Protection of Aircraft) Act 1973;".".

Amendment—

Page 1, title, after "Police" add "and the Australian Protective Service Act 198?".

Bill, as amended, agreed to.

Bill to be reported with amendments, and with an amended title.

The House resumed; Mr Mildren reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr Bowen, by leave, the House adopted the report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.
