- 1 The House met, at 10 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker (the Honourable Leo McLeay) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2 **PETITIONS:** The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:
 - Mr Crean, Mr Langmore and Mr Newell, from 877, 362 and 100 petitioners, respectively, praying that policies be implemented to increase Australian aid, fight poverty, protect the environment and promote human rights.
 - Mr Aldred and Mr Beale, from 208 and 87 petitioners, respectively, praying for a twelve month moratorium followed by a referendum to enable the citizens of Australia to consider and decide whether the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child should be ratified.
 - Mr Peacock and Mr Prosser, from 303 and 69 petitioners, respectively, in similar terms.
 - Mr Newell and Mr Simmons, from 22 and 18 petitioners, respectively, praying that an International Earth Repair Action Decade begin on 5 June 1990.
 - Mr Anderson, from 39 petitioners, praying that consideration of the proposed Multifunction Polis be suspended, pending exhaustive public debate and full public disclosure of the nature and details of the proposal.
 - Dr Catley, from 427 members of the Association of Ukrainians in South Australia, praying that the Ukrainian Republic's right to selfdetermination and national independence be supported and that the proposed Treaty between the USSR and the Ukrainian Republic be opposed.
 - Mr Chaney, from 16 337 petitioners, praying that action be taken to phase out the consumption, production and export of chlorofluorocarbons and halons.
 - Mr Nugent, from 20 petitioners, in similar terms.
 - Mr Elliott, from 27 petitioners, praying that proposals to introduce a charge for prescriptions under the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme and to assess low-interest and no-interest savings accounts as earning 10 per cent income under the social security pension income test not be supported.
 - Mr Somlyay, from 57 petitioners, in similar terms.
 - Mr Keating, from 32 petitioners, praying that funding of abortions through Medicare cease and certain other action be taken to protect the right to life of the unborn.

- Mr Mack, from 2302 petitioners, praying that legislation to prevent the dumping of sewage sludge, industrial waste and inadequately treated sewage effluent into coastal waters be enacted.
- Mr Mack, from 520 petitioners, praying that existing applications for animal patents be rejected and that legislation be amended to prohibit the patenting of animals.
- Mr Nehl, from 7488 residents of the Shire of Nambucca, NSW, praying that the decision by the Health Insurance Commission to terminate the Medicare agency agreement with Macksville Financial Services Pty Ltd be reversed.
- Mr Nehl, from 369 petitioners, praying that funds be provided to enable the Pacific Highway to be made into a four-lane, divided dual carriageway from Hexham, NSW, to the Queensland border.
- Mr Newell, from 25 petitioners, praying that the Therapeutic Goods Regulations be set aside until their effect upon the practice of natural therapies is investigated and assessed and that procedures for the registration of practitioners of natural therapies be initiated.
- Mr Reith, from 20 petitioners, praying that reservations be made to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child prior to its ratification to protect the rights of parents in relation to their children.
- Mr Sawford, from 1332 petitioners, praying that channel 35 of the Citizen's Band Radio Service be allocated for exclusive use as an additional call channel.
- Mr Shack, from 32 petitioners, praying that the signing of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child be deferred until approved by referendum.
- Mr Smith, from 1027 residents of Tasmania, praying that the sale of Australian land to overseas interests be prevented.
- Mr Somlyay, from 409 residents of Queensland, praying for the establishment of a Medicare office at Maroochydore, Qld.
- Mr Somlyay, from 90 petitioners, praying that closure or privatisation of the National Acoustic Laboratory be resisted.
- Mr Somlyay, from 14 petitioners, praying that the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child not be ratified.
- Mr Wilson, from 24 petitioners, praying that proper publicity, public consultation and parliamentary debate take place before any United Nations treaties, covenants or declarations are signed.
- Dr R. L. Woods, from 20 petitioners, praying that steps be taken to maintain both high quality health care for the community and equity for community pharmacists.

Dr R. L. Woods, from 14 petitioners, praying that the restructuring of the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme be reconsidered.

Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an order of the day for the next sitting Thursday, in accordance with sessional order 104A.

6 SECURITY AND COOPERATION IN EAST ASIA AND THE PACIFIC: Mr Langmore, pursuant to notice, moved—That, in view of the recent dramatic improvement in the global strategic environment and of the importance of facilitating extension of those improved conditions to the East Asia and Pacific regions, this House supports the establishment of a Conference on Security and Cooperation in East Asia and the Pacific to increase collective security through negotiation of confidence-building measures and steps towards disarmament.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting Thursday.

7 ASSETS TESTS: Mr Andrew, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House calls on the Government to acknowledge the key role played by primary producers and small businesses in generating exports by (a) agreeing to remove the discriminatory assets test on family allowances and (b) lifting the threshold for the assets test on Austudy.

(3) This section does not apply in relation to any allowance payable to a member of the House of Representatives by reason of holding a particular office, other than any allowance payable in respect of an office specified in the Schedule.'.
