- 2 SOCIAL SECURITY LEGISLATION AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 3) 1991: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time— Debate resumed.
 - It being 12.45 p.m., the debate was interrupted in accordance with sessional order 101A, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

- 5 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—YOUNG PEOPLE: The House was informed that Mr Bradford had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The devasting impact of the Government's policies on the young people of Australia".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

- 6 ENVIRONMENT, RECREATION AND THE ARTS—STANDING COMMITTEE: The House was informed that the Acting Government Whip had nominated Mr Langmore to be a member of the Standing Committee on Environment, Recreation and the Arts in place of Dr Charlesworth.
- 7 PARLIAMENTARY SECRETARIES—AMENDMENT OF RESOLUTION: Mr Beazley (Leader of the House), pursuant to notice, moved—That the resolution of the House of 9 May 1990 concerning Parliamentary Secretaries be amended so as to read:

That, for the purposes of the procedures of the House, any reference to Ministers shall be taken to include Parliamentary Secretaries, with the exception of references to questions seeking information (chapter XI of the standing orders).

- 8 TELEVISING OF PROCEEDINGS: Mr Beazley (Leader of the House), pursuant to notice, moved—That:
 - (1) the House authorises live television broadcast and rebroadcast of:
 - (a) the proceedings of the House and excerpts of proceedings, including the adjournment debate; and
 - (b) the public proceedings of House of Representatives committees, subject to the approval of individual committees—

as provided for by this resolution;

- (2) the House supports in principle the amendment of the *Parliamentary Proceedings Broadcasting Act 1946* to make statutory provision for the televising of the proceedings of the Senate, the House of Representatives and the committees of each House and joint committees of both Houses;
- (3) a standing committee be appointed in each Parliament to consider and determine in respect of live television broadcast and rebroadcast of proceedings and excerpts of proceedings of the House of Representatives and the public proceedings of House of Representatives committees:
 - (a) the conditions to apply to television broadcasters:
 - (b) the guidelines for operators of sound and vision equipment;
 - (c) the guidelines for the televising of House of Representatives committees; and
 - (d) whether breaches of the conditions and guidelines have occurred and, if so, what penalties should apply;
- (4) the committee referred to in paragraph (3) of this resolution shall:
 - (a) consist of those Members of the House of Representatives who are members of the Joint Committee on the Broadcasting of

Parliamentary Proceedings in each Parliament, who shall elect a chairman and deputy chairman; and

(b) have power to send for persons, papers and records;

- (5) until otherwise determined the conditions and guidelines to apply to live television broadcast and rebroadcast shall be those set out in the Report of the Inquiry into the Televising of the House of Representatives and its committees, dated August 1991;
- (6) the arrangements relating to the live television broadcast and rebroadcast of proceedings and excerpts of proceedings of the House of Representatives shall be reviewed by the committee established under paragraph (3) of this resolution prior to the end of the 1993 Autumn sittings of the House; and
- (7) the House requests the Government to seek advice from the Attorney-General as to the legal position of bodies authorised to receive the signal of proceedings with a view to the House granting access to that signal to government departments, political party headquarters and others.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

9 SOCIAL SECURITY LEGISLATION AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 3) 1991: The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Message from the Governor-General: Message No. 190, dated 14 October 1991, from His Excellency the Governor-General was announced recommending an appropriation of revenue for the purposes of the Bill.

Mr Tuckey moved the following amendment: Clause 38, page 14, lines 9 and 10, omit proposed paragraph 838(d), substitute the following paragraph:

"(d) the value of the person's assets does not exceed \$2 000 000 plus an additional amount of \$100 000 for each additional FA child (after the first)".

Debate continued.

Mr P. S. Fisher addressing the committee— It being 7.30 p.m.—Progress to be reported.

The House resumed; Mr Nehl reported accordingly.

Adjournment negatived: The question was accordingly proposed—That the House do now adjourn.

Mr Staples (Minister for Aged, Family and Health Services) requiring the question to be put forthwith without debate—
