1 The House met, at 9.30 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker (the Honourable Stephen Martin) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

#### 2 SUB JUDICE CONVENTION—STATEMENT BY SPEAKER

The Speaker made a statement in response to a question asked of him yesterday by Dr Theophanous (Parliamentary Secretary to the Prime Minister) concerning the rights of the House and its Members to comment on certain matters before the High Court. The Speaker stated that he would consider the application of the *sub judice* convention and make a more detailed statement to the House in due course.

#### **3 PRIVILEGE—STATEMENT BY SPEAKER**

The Speaker referred to the matter of privilege raised yesterday by Mr Howard in connection with an article in the *Australian Financial Review* of 29 March 1994 which reported that a Mr Roger Boland had not been appointed to a position on the Industrial Relations Commission because of evidence Mr Boland had given to a Senate committee. The Speaker stated that he had examined Mr Howard's remarks and the article on which the remarks were based and did not see that the allegations went to the powers, privileges or immunities of the House or its Members. Accordingly, he was not willing to allow precedence to a motion on the matter.

Mr Sinclair addressed the House on the matter.
