The Speaker announced that he had this day received from Dr John Robert Hewson, a letter resigning his seat as Member for the electoral division of Wentworth, in the State of New South Wales, and that he would be consulting with Party Leaders concerning the date of the by-election.

3 INTERNET—STATEMENT BY SPEAKER

The Speaker made a statement concerning public electronic access to parliamentary materials by way of the Internet.

4 SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDER 217

Mr Snowdon (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Employment, Education and Training), for Mr Beazley (Leader of the House), pursuant to notice, moved—That standing order 217 (day fixed for second reading) be suspended in respect of the Land Fund and Indigenous Land Corporation (ATSIC Amendment) Bill 1994.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.
