# MONDAY, 27 MAY 1996

1 The House met, at 12.30 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker (the Honourable Bob Halverson) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

#### **2 NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK**

Mr Nugent, pursuant to notice, moved—That this House:

- welcomes the initiative of the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation to launch a National Reconciliation Week to be held each year from 27 May to 3 June for at least the next five years up to 2001, the centenary of federation;
- (2) notes that the inaugural National Reconciliation Week beginning on 27 May 1996 will launch twelve months of community activities and a public awareness campaign leading up to the Australian Reconciliation Convention, which will be held during National Reconciliation Week in 1997;
- (3) reaffirms its commitment to a process of reconciliation; and
- (4) calls on all Australians to support the National Reconciliation Week and thereby to advance the reconciliation process.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

#### 3 GUN CONTROL

Ms Worth, pursuant to notice, moved—That the House:

- (1) extends its sympathies to the family and friends of all the victims of the Port Arthur massacre;
- (2) recognises the outstanding work done by the police and emergency services during the tragedy and the efforts of those associated with the counselling of victims, their families and friends;

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- (3) congratulates the Prime Minister and the State and Territory governments in making a significant contribution to public safety by moving to ban automatic and semi-automatic rifles and shotguns;
- (4) acknowledges the contribution made by the Leader of the Opposition in securing a bipartisan approach to the issue of gun control; and
- (5) acknowledges that many law abiding citizens who own guns may be inconvenienced by the ban on some types of firearms.

## Debate ensued.

It being 1.45 p.m., the debate was interrupted in accordance with standing order 101A, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

#### **8 PETITIONS**

The Clerk announced that the following Members had each lodged petitions for presentation, viz.:

Mr Cobb, Mr Latham, Mr McLeay, Mr Melham and Mr A. P. Thomson, from 130, 60, 110, 15 and 16 petitioners, respectively, praying that the drug Betaferon be sudsidised under the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme.

Ms Gambaro and Mrs Sullivan, from 120 and 17 petitioners, respectively, praying that the exclusiveness of marriage as being between one male and one female be preserved and that the Marriage Act be amended to prohibit certain marriages.

Mr Abbott, from 407 petitioners, praying that local government be provided a consent role in the installation of mobile telephone base stations and overhead cabling.

Mr Filing, from 3927 petitioners, praying that an Australian Embassy be established in the Republic of Croatia.

Mr Filing, from 1447 petitioners, praying that certain action be taken to stop the use of "how to vote" cards at federal and State elections.

Mr Filing, from 836 petitioners, praying that certain legislative action be taken to prevent the transmission of indecent or obscene material on the information superhighway.

Mr Fitzgibbon, from 9850 petitioners, praying that certain action be taken to promote the recognition of human rights in Sudan.

Mrs D. M. Kelly, from 753 residents of Queensland, praying that action be taken to improve television reception in and around Sarina, Qld.

Mr P. F. Morris, from 737 electors of the Division of Shortland, praying that the Commonwealth Bank of Australia be called on to maintain its existing banking services at Budgewoi, NSW.

Mr Reith, from 1347 petitioners, praying that Betaferon be made available as a subsidised drug.

Mr Ronaldson, from 534 residents of Victoria, praying that the proposed closure of the office of the Department of Social Security at Wendouree, Vic., not be supported.

Mr Ronaldson, from 20 petitioners, praying that certain action be taken to reduce the difference in petrol pricing between country Victoria and metropolitan Melbourne.

Mr Ronaldson, from 12 petitioners, praying that certain action be taken to reduce the difference in petrol pricing between city and country areas.

Mr Ruddock, from 8 petitioners, praying that certain moves to tighten gun laws be supported.

Mr Sawford, from 5 residents of South Australia, praying that certain shortcomings in the implementation of national competition policy be removed.

Mr Somlyay, from 691 residents of Queensland, praying that the proposal to establish a pharmacy at Montville, Qld, be allowed to proceed.

Petitions received.

## 9 MIDDLE EAST CONFLICT

Mr Brereton, pursuant to notice, moved—That the Australian Parliament:

- (1) declares its support for world efforts to secure peace in the Middle East through a settlement of the present conflict between the Hezbollah and Israel in Southern Lebanon;
- (2) deplores the tragic loss of life and the endangerment of the innocent civilian population as a result of this conflict;
- (3) is of the view that a settlement must involve the Governments of Lebanon, Syria and Israel and be based on the following guarantees:
  - (a) the territorial integrity of Lebanon and all countries in the region; and

- (b) the absolute right of security for the citizens of Israel; and
- (4) supports the implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 425 as part of the settlement.

Debate ensued.

Mr Brereton, by leave, again addressed the House without closing the debate.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

# 12 TAXATION LAWS AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 1) 1996

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr Latham who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House is of the opinion that the Government has:

- (1) by adopting a permanent rate of 10% beyond 1996-97, failed to fulfil its election promise to small businesses and self-funded retirees to reduce the provisional tax uplift factor to 6%;
- (2) failed to fulfil its long-standing promise to set the provisional tax uplift factor at rates corresponding to forecasts for inflation, income growth and economic growth; and
- (3) failed to deliver a sound policy framework for small business, with:

- (a) the contractionary impact of withdrawing more than 2% GDP from the income/expenditure stream in the forthcoming budget;
- (b) failure to consider an even lower uplift factor in light of the Government's downward revision of the growth forecasts for 1996-97 (3.75% to 3.25%);
- (c) cuts to small business support programs such as EMDG, AusIndustry, NIES and the Innovate Australia programs;
- (d) higher underlying interest rates with the abolition of wages policy; and
- (e) the Government's failure to support amendments to the Trade Practices Act to strengthen the provisions concerning harsh or oppressive conduct in circumstances where a small business is vulnerable and economically captive to another enterprise".
