Mr Hockey, from 1 petitioner, praying that thiamine hydrochloride be restored to the schedule of pharmaceutical benefits.

Mr Hockey, from 1 petitioner, praying that the medication Rocaltrol be listed under the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme.

15 NATIONAL WAGE-EARNER PROTECTION FUND SCHEME

- (1) gives consideration to the adoption of a national wage-earner protection fund scheme as is similarly found in Japan, the United Kingdom, Belgium, Sweden, Finland, Norway, Spain, Austria, Denmark, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Italy, Israel, Greece, Ireland, Portugal, the Canadian provinces of Manitoba and Quebec and the state of Oregon in the United States of America to insure and protect Australian workers from company insolvency;
- (2) recognises that Australian employees should never be left in arrears of wages or of other entitlements due to the insolvency of the company for which they work; and
- (3) conducts an inquiry through the relevant parliamentary standing committee into the viability of, and the benefits associated with, the adoption of a national wage-earner protection fund scheme for all Australians.
