3 SUSPENSION OF STANDING AND SESSIONAL ORDERS MOVED

Ms Macklin moved—That so much of the standing and sessional orders be suspended as would prevent the Member for Jagajaga moving forthwith to defer consideration of the Bills in the Aged Care legislative package (orders of the day Nos. 1 to 3, government business) until details relating to the implementation of the bills are resolved, including:

- (1) the provision of an adequate capital subsidy for concessional residents instead of the Government's much-derided proposed rate of \$5 per day;
- (2) agreed specific prudential arrangements for safeguarding residents' upfront entry fees;
- (3) details of the residential subsidy classification instrument and arrangements for training staff in its use;
- (4) the establishment of an independent body to monitor the numbers of concessional residents and exempt beds by region and facility, waiting periods for entry into and transfer to nursing homes and hostels by resident status, sums paid as accommodation bonds by facility, places provided by metropolitan/rural/remote location and socio-economic status etc. and other appropriate details relating to the provision of health care; and

(5) appropriate mechanisms for accountability for the use of funds, particularly to ensure that high quality nursing and personal care staff are employed to care for the residents of aged care homes, and that capital funds are used to upgrade nursing homes.

- (2) the Government's election commitment not to reduce the sugar tariff, it having promised it would not reduce the sugar tariff beyond the present level of \$55 per tonne as Australia had already met its obligations under the World Trade Organisation agreement;
- (3) the fact that Australia's Uruguay Round obligation for sugar is a tariff of \$70 per tonne by the year 2000, and Australia's current tariff at \$55 per tonne is comfortably within that obligation;
- (4) the fact that many of our export destinations have sugar tariffs massively higher than us, which suggests that there is no reason for Australia to go it alone on the sugar tariff;
- (5) despite the above, the Government's decision to abolish the sugar tariff effective from 1 July 1997; and
- (6) the fact that the abolition of the proposed tariff will mean job losses and a payout of \$27m. to Queensland sugar growers—

so much of the standing and sessional orders be suspended as would prevent order of the day No. 66, government business, being called on forthwith so that

Members will have an opportunity to debate and vote on the proposals contained in Customs Tariff Proposal No. 2 (1997) to remove customs duty from sugar and sugar by-products.

2 APPROPRIATION BILL (NO. 1) 1997-98—BUDGET DEBATE

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr G. J. Evans (Deputy Leader of the Opposition), viz.—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the Bill a second reading, the House notes that the Budget:

- (1) does nothing for jobs—the nation's most overwhelming current economic and social problem;
- (2) squanders, by breaking the promise to introduce superannuation cocontributions, an historic opportunity to build a massive new private savings pool, and does so in a way that undercuts decent retirement incomes for lower and middle income earners:
- (3) continues the assault on families, the elderly and the needy;
- (4) contains many mindless and counter-productive cuts affecting the quality and decency of life in Australia, and harming our international reputation;
- (5) for all its cuts and destructive impact, did not meet the exaggerated expectations the Government had created as to the size of its deficit reduction achievements and projected future surpluses; and
- (6) has been characterised by even the Government's best friends as lacking in shape, direction and vision"—

Debate resumed.
