18 TAXATION LAWS AMENDMENT BILL (NO. 2) 2001

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr K. J. Thomson who moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading, the House condemns the Government for:

- (1) massively increasing the complexity of the tax system for small business, particularly the fringe benefits tax and its interaction with the GST;
- (2) massively increasing the taxation compliance burden for small business and for charities;
- (3) breaching the Prime Minister's 1996 pledge to halve small business red tape;
- (4) breaching its promise that the Australian economy, and all Australians, would be better off under the new tax system; and
- (5) wasting many millions of dollars on advertising and promoting the new taxation arrangements to try and cover the problems listed above".

Debate continued.

Amendment negatived.

Question—That the Bill be now read a second time—put and passed—Bill read a second time.

Leave granted for third reading to be moved forthwith.

On the motion of Mr Slipper (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Finance and Administration), the Bill was read a third time.
