WEDNESDAY, 28 MAY 2003

1 The House met, at 9 a.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker (the Honourable Neil Andrew) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

2 HEALTH LEGISLATION AMENDMENT (MEDICARE AND PRIVATE HEALTH INSURANCE) BILL 2003

Ms Worth (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Health and Ageing), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the law relating to medicare and private health insurance, and for related purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Ms Worth moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Paper

Ms Worth presented an explanatory memorandum to the Bill.

Debate adjourned (Mr S. F. Smith), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

3 INDUSTRIAL CHEMICALS (NOTIFICATION AND ASSESSMENT) AMENDMENT BILL 2003

Ms Worth (Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Health and Ageing), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Industrial Chemicals (Notification and Assessment) Act 1989*, and for related purposes.

Bill read a first time.

Ms Worth moved—That the Bill be now read a second time.

Paper

Ms Worth presented an explanatory memorandum to the Bill.

Debate adjourned (Mr S. F. Smith), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

4 HEALTH CARE (APPROPRIATION) AMENDMENT BILL 2003

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed by Mr S. F. Smith who moved, as an amendment—That all words after “That” be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: “whilst not opposing the Bill, the House condemns the Government for its health policy failures, including:

- (a) the Howard Government’s withdrawal of \$918 million from public hospitals over the next four years;
- (b) the Howard Government’s unfair Medicare package which will result in bulk billing, in time, only being available to pensioners and concession card holders and families being left to pay more and more for their health care;
- (c) the Howard Government’s decision to increase the cost of essential medicines by up to 30%, hitting the sickest and the poorest hardest; and
- (d) the Howard Government’s refusal to review the \$2.3 billion private health insurance rebate to ensure that it provides value for money for consumers and taxpayers”.

Debate continued.

It being 2 p.m., the debate was interrupted in accordance with standing order 101A, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

Mr Anderson (Minister for Transport and Regional Services) presented the following paper:

6 MEMBER ORDERED TO WITHDRAW

At 3.31 p.m. the Member for Werriwa (Mr Latham) was ordered, under standing order 304A, to withdraw from the House for one hour for making comments in respect of the Chair, and he accordingly withdrew from the Chamber.

8 DISCUSSION OF MATTER OF PUBLIC IMPORTANCE—AUSTRALIA'S TOURISM INDUSTRY

The House was informed that Mr G. M. O'Connor had proposed that a definite matter of public importance be submitted to the House for discussion, namely, "The failure of the Government to deliver a Green Paper and 10 year industry plan for Australia's tourism industry".

The proposed discussion having received the necessary support—

Mr G. M. O'Connor addressed the House.

Discussion ensued.

Discussion concluded.

9 MURRAY-DARLING BASIN AMENDMENT BILL 2002—REPORT FROM MAIN COMMITTEE

The Deputy Speaker reported that the Bill had been fully considered by the Main Committee and agreed to without amendment, and presented a certified copy of the Bill.

Bill agreed to.

On the motion of Mrs D. S. Vale (Minister for Veterans' Affairs), by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

10 HEALTH CARE (APPROPRIATION) AMENDMENT BILL 2003

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the Bill be now read a second time—*And on the amendment moved thereto by Mr S. F. Smith (see item No. 4, page 905)*—

Debate resumed.
