1 The House met, at 12.30 p.m., pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker (the Honourable David Hawker) took the Chair, and read Prayers.

2 LEGAL AND CONSTITUTIONAL AFFAIRS—STANDING COMMITTEE—REPORT—STATEMENTS BY MEMBERS—MOTION TO TAKE NOTE OF DOCUMENT—REFERENCE TO MAIN COMMITTEE

Mr Slipper (Chair) presented the following documents:

Legal and Constitutional Affairs—Standing Committee—The long road to statehood: Report of the inquiry into the federal implications of statehood for the Northern Territory—
Report, May 2007.

Evidence received by the committee.

Minutes of proceedings.

Report ordered to be made a Parliamentary Paper.

Statements in connection with the report were made.

The time allotted for making statements on the report having expired—

Mr Slipper moved—That the House take note of the report.

In accordance with standing order 39, the debate was adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.

Mr Slipper moved—That the order of the day be referred to the Main Committee for debate.

Question—put and passed.

3 AVOIDING DANGEROUS CLIMATE CHANGE (KYOTO PROTOCOL RATIFICATION) BILL 2007

Mr Garrett, pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to ratify the Kyoto Protocol to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change.

Document

Mr Garrett presented an explanatory memorandum to the bill.

Mr Garrett made a statement in relation to the bill.

Bill read a first time.

Ordered—That the second reading be made an order of the day for the next sitting, in accordance with standing order 41.

4 SMALL BUSINESS

Mrs Gash, pursuant to notice, moved—That the House:

- (1) notes the contribution of small business to regional economies;
- (2) acknowledges that small, micro businesses employ many people and are worthy of protection against predatory behaviour by conglomerates, including organised trade unions;
- (3) acknowledges the role small, family-owned businesses play in creating employment opportunities in smaller communities;

- (4) recognises the disadvantages faced by small business operators in competing against major chains in regional areas; and
- (5) calls on the Government to take all steps necessary to ensure that small business in Australia remains viable in the face of the many threats confronting small business operators.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

5 REMOVAL OF INDIGENOUS CHILDREN

Ms Macklin, pursuant to notice, moved—That the House:

- (1) notes that:
 - (a) 26 May marks the tenth anniversary of the *Bringing Them Home* report, which documented the systematic removal of up to 100,000 indigenous children from their families between 1910 and the 1970s, and its serious, and ongoing impact;
 - (b) the Howard Government's decision to not apologise for this systematic removal has compounded the distress of survivors and held us all back from achieving genuine reconciliation;
 - (c) research subsequent to the report has shown that indigenous children who were removed:
 - (i) were more likely to have been victims of family violence (38 per cent compared to the figure of 23 per cent for the broader indigenous population);
 - (ii) were 2.3 times more likely to experience clinical depression and behavioural difficulties;
 - (iii) had double the rate of both alcohol and other drug use than other indigenous children; and
 - (iv) were more likely to end up in jail; and
 - (d) a recent Urbis Keys Young report commissioned by the Government described the Government's response to date as "poorly coordinated and insufficiently targeted" and also revealed that some *Bringing Them Home* and *Link-Up* counsellors are struggling to cope with up to more than 80 clients each, compared with the average caseload of 25 for a mental health worker in mainstream services; and
- (2) calls on the Government to:
 - (a) apologise for past policies and practices that resulted in the systematic and forced removal of indigenous children from their families; and
 - (b) immediately implement measures to address the continuing adverse social, physical and mental health outcomes impacting on the Stolen Generation and subsequent generations.

Document

Ms Macklin, by leave, presented the following document:

Close the indigenous health gap—GetUp! Action for Australia—Out of order petition.

Debate ensued.

At 1.45 p.m., the time allotted for the debate having expired, the debate was interrupted in accordance with standing order 43, Mr Slipper was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed, and the resumption of the debate was made an order of the day for the next sitting.

Mr Howard (Prime Minister) informed the House that, during the absence of Mr Turnbull (Minister for the Environment and Water Resources), Mr M. A. J. Vaile (Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Transport and Regional Services) would answer questions on his behalf.

Mr Howard also informed the House that, during the absences of Mr Downer (Minister for Foreign Affairs) and Mr Macfarlane (Minister for Industry, Tourism and Resources), Mr Truss (Minister for Trade) would answer questions on their behalf.

8 PROPOSED ALTERATION OF SITTINGS OF THE HOUSE AND ADDRESSES TO PARLIAMENT

Mr Howard (Prime Minister), by indulgence, informed the House of bilateral visits associated with APEC, and that it was proposed that the House not sit on Monday, 10 September 2007.

Mr Howard also advised that it was proposed that the Prime Minister of Japan, His Excellency Mr Shinzo Abe, address the Parliament on Tuesday, 11 September 2007, and that the Prime Minister of Canada, the Right Honourable Stephen Harper, address the Parliament on Wednesday, 12 September 2007.

Mr Rudd (Leader of the Opposition), by indulgence, also made a statement on the matter.

9 QUESTIONS

Questions without notice being asked—

Member directed to leave

At 2.39 p.m. the Member for Lilley (Mr Swan) was directed, under standing order 94, to leave the Chamber for one hour for continuing to interject after a warning had been given from the Chair, and he accordingly left the Chamber.

12 ROAD ACCIDENTS

Mr Johnson, pursuant to notice, moved—That the House:

- (1) recognise the tragic loss of 1,605 lives on our roads in 2006, including 336 in Queensland;
- (2) recognise that road crashes remain the biggest killer of young Australians aged 16 to 25 and that in any given year, people aged between 18 and 24 are twice as likely to die in road smashes than other drivers;
- (3) also recognise that researchers at the University of Queensland have calculated that the death and injury from road accidents costs the national economy some \$17 billion a year, or the equivalent of 2.3 per cent of Australia's gross national income; and
- (4) commend the Government for extending the AusLink Black Spot program, which has already eliminated some 700 dangerous crash sites in Queensland alone, for a further two years, from 2006-07 to 2007-08, at a cost of \$90 million.

Debate ensued.

- (1) recognises that the Federal Government needs to invest in education and improving the skills of Australians to ensure that all students have the opportunity to complete Year 12 at high school and ensure that they have appropriate entry-level training for their chosen trade or vocation; and
- (2) condemns the failure of the Government to invest in education and skills for Australia's future, particularly when the commodity boom moderates.

Debate ensued.

The time allotted for private Members' business having expired, the debate was interrupted, Mr Henry was granted leave to continue his speech when the debate is resumed, and the resumption of the debate was made an order of the day for the next sitting.

Mr Hockey (Minister for Employment and Workplace Relations), pursuant to notice, presented a Bill for an Act to amend the *Workplace Relations Act 1996*, and for other purposes.

Document

Mr Hockey presented an explanatory memorandum to the bill.

Bill read a first time.

Mr Hockey moved—That the bill be now read a second time.

Debate adjourned (Ms Gillard—Deputy Leader of the Opposition), and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for the next sitting.

16 SPECIAL ADJOURNMENT

Mr Robb (Minister for Vocational and Further Education) moved—That the House, at its rising, adjourn until Tuesday, 29 May 2007, at 12.30 p.m., unless the Speaker or, in the event of the Speaker being unavailable, the Deputy Speaker, fixes an alternative day or hour of meeting and for government business to take precedence from 12.30 p.m. until 2 p.m. on that day.

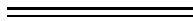

- (1) despite record high commodity prices from surging demand from India and China and rising levels of taxation, the Government has failed to secure Australia’s long term economic fundamentals and should be condemned for its failure to:
 - (a) address Australia’s flagging productivity growth;
 - (b) stem the widening current account deficit and trade deficits;
 - (c) attend to the long term relative decline in education and training investment undercutting workplace productivity;
 - (d) provide national leadership on infrastructure including a high speed national broadband network for the whole country;
 - (e) expand and encourage research and development to move Australian industry and exports up the value-chain; and
 - (f) reform our health system to equip it for a future focused on prevention, early intervention and an ageing population;
- (2) the Government’s failure to address the damaging consequences of climate change is endangering Australia’s future economic prosperity;
- (3) the Government’s extreme industrial relations laws will lower wages and conditions for many workers and do nothing to enhance productivity, participation or economic growth; and
- (4) the Government’s Budget documents fail the test of transparency and accountability”—

Debate resumed.
