Question—put and passed.

12 RESALE ROYALTY RIGHT FOR VISUAL ARTISTS BILL 2008—REPORT FROM MAIN COMMITTEE

The Deputy Speaker reported that the bill had been fully considered by the Main Committee and agreed to with amendments (*see item No. 3, Minutes of Proceedings of the Main Committee, 7 September 2009*), and presented a certified copy of the bill together with a schedule of amendments.

Amendments made by the Main Committee agreed to.

Bill, as amended, agreed to.

On the motion of Mr Clare (Parliamentary Secretary for Employment), by leave, the bill was read a third time.

13 HEALTH LEGISLATION AMENDMENT (MIDWIVES AND NURSE PRACTITIONERS) BILL 2009

The order of the day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question—That the bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Mrs Mirabella moved, as an amendment—That all words after "That" be omitted with a view to substituting the following words: "whilst not declining to give the bill a second reading, the House:

- (1) acknowledges that the bill does not:
 - (a) facilitate a full and informed debate by requiring the Minister to table all actuarial modelling relating to the extension of Commonwealth Medical Indemnity Insurance to midwives providing birthing services outside of a clinical setting;
 - (b) further facilitate a full and informed debate by requiring a review into the provision of medical indemnity insurance to midwives providing birthing services outside of a clinical setting, with the review being tabled in Parliament on or before 1 June 2012; and
 - (c) have in its objects the goal of not restricting the rights of women to choose home birth as an option provided the wellbeing of the mother and child are not put at risk; and
- (2) calls on the Government to make such amendments to the bill as would rectify these flaws".

Debate continued.

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the question—put.

A division having been called for, in accordance with standing order 133 the division was deferred until 8 p.m.

Debate adjourned, and the resumption of the debate made an order of the day for a later hour this day.
