# 3 PARLIAMENTARY STANDING COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC WORKS—REPORT—STATEMENT BY SPEAKER

The Speaker made a statement concerning the matter of privilege and subsequent Parliamentary Standing Committee on Public Works report titled: Unauthorised disclosure of committee proceedings and evidence. The Speaker stated that he regarded the unauthorised disclosure of private information given to committees very seriously. He noted that the source of the disclosure had been identified and the Member involved had apologised and given undertakings not to disclose information in the future. He also noted that the Public Works Committee had expressed the view that the alleged disclosure may result in substantial interference with its future work, particularly affecting its relationship with key witnesses. The Speaker said that he would be very concerned if there were a continuing effect on these relationships. The circumstances of the matter should give assurance to witnesses that the House and its committees regard these matters very seriously and will take action to protect the confidentiality of committee proceedings. The Speaker further stated that it was not only a matter of privilege but also an action that related to the ethical behaviour of a Member and was yet another case where a Members' code of conduct might have been of some assistance. As there was no disagreement as to the key facts and as the Public Works Committee had dealt with matters that would ordinarily be covered by the Committee of Privileges and Members' Interests, the Speaker stated that little would be achieved by further inquiry. The Speaker thanked the Public Works Committee for having thoroughly and expeditiously dealt with the matter on behalf of the House.

# 8 EDUCATION SERVICES FOR OVERSEAS STUDENTS AMENDMENT (RE-REGISTRATION OF PROVIDERS AND OTHER MEASURES) BILL 2009—SENATE'S AMENDMENTS

The order of the day having been read for the consideration of the amendments made by the Senate—

On the motion of Ms Gillard (Minister for Education), amendment No.1 was agreed to, after debate.

On the motion of Ms Gillard, amendments Nos 2 and 3 were disagreed to, after debate.

Ms Gillard presented reasons, which were circulated, and are as follows:

Reasons of the House of Representatives for disagreeing to the amendments of the Senate

Senate Amendments Number 2 and 3

Amendments 2 and 3 propose that the Minister be given the power to define in regulations any consequential expenses that a defaulting provider should pay back to a student in addition to course money. This amendment is not supported because it is not costed and contains no detail about what would be considered as a certain consequential cost. It has the potential to exhaust the capacity of the Assurance Fund and commit the Government to significant taxpayer outlay for expenses not normally considered education-related nor reimbursed to domestic students. Examples of possible consequential costs include: international and domestic travel; accommodation and food; education agent fees; travel and medical insurance; and computers and internet costs.

The ESOS legislation already provides for a generous and comprehensive consumer protection framework which for the main part has worked very well in placing students in an alternative course or refunding their fees in a timely way following provider default. Australia is the only country that offers this level of assurance. Furthermore, students affected by closures are readily given an extension on their visa without restrictions on working while they await alternative arrangements.

In the context of significant growth and change in the international sector, the adequacy and sustainability of the consumer protection model is currently being looked as part of the ESOS Review and the Government considers that this amendment is more appropriately referred to the Review. Accordingly, the House of Representatives does not accept this amendment.

On the motion of Ms Gillard, the reasons were adopted.
