THURSDAY, 11TH APRIL, 1918.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. PAPERS.—The following Papers were presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General— The War —Holland—
 - Netherlands Government—Correspondence respecting the Claims preferred against His Majesty's Government for Damages sustained by the Netherlands Steamships Elwe and $B_{crnisse}$ through the action of German Submarines. (Paper presented to the British Parliament.)
 - Transit Traffic across Holland—Materials susceptible of employment as Military Supplies— Correspondence (dated 9th October to 6th November, 1917).
 - Further correspondence (with map) (dated 10th November, 1915, to 15th January, 1918). (Papers presented to the British Parliament.)

Severally ordered to lie on the Table.

- 3. POSTFONEMENT OF ORDERS OF THE DAY.—Ordered, That the Orders of the Day, Government Business, be postponed until after the Notice of Motion, Government Business.
- 4. LANDS ACQUISITION (DEFENCE) BILL. --Mr. Glynn moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to enable the Commonwealth to acquire certain lands for Defence purposes.

Question-put and passed.

Mr. Glynn then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Ordered-That the second reading be made an Order of the Day for to-morrow.

5. SUPPLY RESOLUTION [SUPPLY BILL.]—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

(In the Committee.)

SUPPLY BILL (No. 6) 1917-18.

Debate resumed on the motion of Mr. Watt, That there be granted to His Majesty for or towards defraying the services of the year 1917-18 a sum not exceeding £5,068,484.

Mr. Boyd moved, as an amendment, That the sum be reduced by $\pounds 1$.

Debate continued.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

Resolved—That the House will, to-morrow, again resolve itself into the said Committee. F.6286.
