THURSDAY, 16TH MAY, 1918.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Message from the Governor-General.—Assent to Kalgoorlie to Port Augusta Railway Lands Bill.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was received, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker:—

A Bill intituled "An Act relating to Linds required for the purposes of the Kalgoorlie to Port Augusta Railway," as finally passed by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth, having been presented to the Governor-General for the Royal Assent, His Excellency has, in the name and on behalf of His Majesty, assented to the said Act.

3. Message from the Governor-General.—War Loan Bill (1918) [£80,000,000].—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker:—

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to authorize the raising and expending of the sum of Eighty million pounds for War purposes.

Contract Immigrants Act—Return for 1917, respecting Contract Immigrants admitted or refused admission into the Commonwealth, &c.

Immigration Act—Return for 1917 showing—(a) Persons refused admission to the Commonwealth;
() Persons who passed the dictation test; (c) Persons admitted without being asked to pass the dictation test; (l) Departures of colored persons from the Commonwealth.

Ordered-That the two last-mentioned Papers be printed.

7. INCOME TAX ASSESSMENT BILL (1918). The Order of the Day having been read for the further reconsideration of this Bill in Committee of the whole House—Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

"and

(o) All interest actually paid by the taxpayer in the year immediately preceding the year of assessment upon money borrowed and actually used or invested in Australia."

Amendment negatived.

Clause, as amended, agreed to.

Re-committed clause 48-

Debated and agreed to.

Bill to be reported with further amendments.

The House resumed; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

Mr. Glynn moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended, to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay.

Question—put and passed.

On the motion of Mr. Glynn, the House adopted the Reports.

Mr. Glynn moved, That the Bill be now read a third time.

Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a third time.

8. LOANS SINKING FUND BILL.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the question, That the Bill be now read a second time—

Debate resumed.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

Progress to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

Clauses 6 and 7 agreed to.
Title agreed to.
Bill to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Groom, the House adopted the Report.

Mr. Groom moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended to enable the remaining stage to be passed without delay.

Question—put and passed.

On the motion of Mr. Groom, the Bill was read a third time.

12. Inscribed Stock Bill (1918).—The Order of the Day having been read for the further consideration of this Bill in Committee of the whole House—Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House again resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Bill agreed to, and to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Groom, the House adopted the Report.

Mr. Groom moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended to enable the remaining stage to be passed without delay.

Question-put and passed.

On the motion of Mr. Groom, the Bill was read a third time.

13. Defence Bill (1918).—The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading—Mr. Wise moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Mr. Tudor moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered - That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for to-morrow.

14. Adjournment.—Mr. Watt moved, That the House do now adjourn. Debate ensued.
