HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

WEDNESDAY, 29TH MAY, 1918

- 1. The House met, at three o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Petition.—Mr. Tudor presented a Petition from certain persons resident in Australia opposed to the deportation of Italians and others, in reference to the deportation of Italians resident in Australia, for military service overseas, and praying that no such deportations may take place, but that such persons may be allowed to naturalize themselves if they so desire, and to continue as good citizens of our country.

Petition received and read.

3. STANDING ORDERS COMMITTEE—STANDING ORDER NO. 29A (PRAYERS).—Mr. Watt (for Mr. Speaker, Chairman) brought up a Report from the Standing Orders Committee, recommending an amendment of Standing Order No. 29A (Prayers).

The Report was read by the Clerk, as follows:—

REPORT.

The Standing Committee on Standing Orders has the honour to report to your honorable House as follows:—

I. The Committee recommends to the House of Representatives that the initial Prayer read at the opening of the House be amended so as to read as follows:—

Almighty God, we humbly beseech Thee to vouchsafe Thy blessing upon this Parliament. Direct and prosper our deliberations to the advancement of Thy glory, and the true welfare of the people of Australia.

II. The Committee further recommends that, during the continuance of the War, the following additional Prayer be read before the Lord's Prayer:—

Strengthen, O Lord, the sailors and soldiers of our Commonwealth, our Empire, and our Allies; protect them from all dangers; give them speedy victory over their enemies; and grant that an honorable and a lasting peace may result from their valour and their sacrifices.
