- 1. The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Postponement of Business.—Ordered.—That the intervening Business be postponed until after the consideration of Notice of Motion No. 7, Government Business.
- SARD—OMISSION OF CERTAIN REMARKS DURING THE WAR.—Mr. Groom moved, pursuant to notice, That, during the progress of the present war, Mr. Speaker be and is hereby authorized, at his discretion, to direct the omission from Hansard of any remarks made in the House of Representatives in the course of debate, or in any other proceedings in the House of Representatives, to which his attention may be directed by the Law Officers of the Crown as being calculated to prejudice His Majesty's relations with a foreign Power, or the successful prosecution of the war, or to imperil the safety of the Commonwealth.

Debate ensued.

Mr. R. W. Foster moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and passed.

Ordered—That the resumption of the debate be made an Order of the Day for a later hour this day.

4. Censorship by Members of their Speeches on recent Urgency Adjournment Motion.—Mr. Watt, by leave, moved, That the House accords permission to Members who spoke on the Motion for the Adjournment of the House yesterday to censor the Hansard Reports of their own speeches. Debate ensued.

Question—put and passed.

5. Hansard—Omission of Certain Remarks during the War.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate upon the following Motion of Mr. Groom:—That, during the progress of the present war, Mr. Speaker be and is hereby authorized, at his discretion, to direct the omission from Hansard of any remarks made in the House of Representatives in the course of debate, or in any other proceedings in the House of Representatives, to which his attention may be directed by the Law Officers of the Crown as being calculated to prejudice His Majesty's relations with a foreign Power, or the successful prosecution of the war, or to imperil the safety of the Commonwealth-
