Agreed to by Senate with an amendment, 553. Senate's amendment considered in Committee and agreed to, and Report adopted by absolute majority (on division), 556. (*Bill awaiting Referendum.*)

CONTROL OF NAVAL WATERS BILL.—Brought from Senate and read a first time, 325. Second reading; Committee; reported without amendment; report adopted, and (Standing Orders having been suspended) Bill read a third time, 372. Assented to, 383. *Act No. 28 of 1918.*
