HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

THURSDAY, 23RD SEPTEMBER, 1920.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT-WHEAT.--Mr. Hughes, by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to the new Wheat Crop and its connexion with the Wheat "Pool".
- 3. MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL.—LOAN BILL (1920) [£4,286,490].—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker :—

R. M. FERGUSON,

Governor-General.

Message No. 32.

In accordance with the requirements of section fifty-six of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to authorize the raising and expending of the sum of Four million two hundred and eighty-six thousand four hundred and ninety pounds for certain purposes.

Melbourne, 21st September, 1920.

Ordered-That the consideration of the foregoing Message, in Committee of the whole House, be made an Order of the Day for a later hour this day.

- 4. ADJOURNMENT-MOTION FOR PURPOSE OF DISCUSSION.—Mr. Tudor rose in his place, and said that he proposed to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, "The present unsatisfactory position of the promised guarantee of 5s. per bushel for wheat delivered at railway sidings for the 1920-21 harvest".
 - Mr. Speaker thereupon called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly—

Mr. Tudor moved, That the House do now adjourn.

- Debate ensued.
- It being two hours after the time fixed for the meeting of the House, the debate was interrupted in accordance with Standing Order No. 119, and the Business of the Day was called on.

- 8. SUPPLY RESOLUTION.-The Resolution reported from the Committee of Supply was read, and, on the motion of Sir Joseph Cook, was adopted by the House.
- 9. WAYS AND MEANS RESOLUTION [ESTIMATES-ADDITIONS, NEW WORKS, BUILDINGS, ETC., 1920-21].-The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

Additions, New Works, Buildings, etc., 1920-21.

Resolved, on the motion of Sir Joseph Cook-That, towards making good the Supply granted to His Majesty for Additions, New Works, Buildings, &c. for the year 1920-21, there be granted out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund a sum not exceeding £3,070,502. Resolution to be reported, and leave asked to sit again.

The House resumed ; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

Resolved—That the House will, at a later hour this day, again resolve itself into the said Committee. The Resolution reported from the Committee was read, and, on the motion of Sir Joseph Cook, was adopted by the House.

Ordered-That Sir Joseph Cook and Mr. Groom do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

10. APPROPRIATION (WORKS AND BUILDINGS) BILL 1920-21.-Sir Joseph Cook then brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill for an Act to grant and apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and twenty-one for the purposes of Additions, New Works, Buildings, &c., and to appropriate such sum," and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question-put and passed.-Bill read a first time.

Sir Joseph Cook moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Question-put and passed.-Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Bill agreed to, and to be reported without amendment.

On the motion of Sir Joseph Cook, the House adopted the Report, and the Bill was read a third time.

The House resumed ; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

11. LOAN BILL (1920)-[£4,286,490].-The Order of the Day having been read for the consideration in Committee of the whole House of His Excellency the Governor-General's Message No. 32-Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Resolved, on the motion of Mr. Groom, after debate-That it is expedient that an appropriation of moneys be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to authorize the Raising and Expending of a sum of Four million two hundred and eighty-six thousand four hundred and ninety pounds for certain purposes.

Resolution to be reported.

The House resumed ; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly.

Mr. Groom moved, pursuant to contingent notice, That the Standing Orders be suspended to enable the remaining stages to be passed without delay.

Question put and passed.

The said Resolution was read, and, on the motion of Mr. Groom, was adopted by the House.

Ordered-That Mr. Groom and Sir Joseph Cook do prepare and bring in a Bill to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Mr. Groom then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time. Question—put and passed.—Bill read a first time.

Mr. Groom moved, That the Bill be now read a second time.

Question—put and passed.—Bill read a second time. Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

(In the Committee.)

Clauses 1, 2, and 3 agreed to.
