WEDNESDAY, 20TH OCTOBER, 1920.

- 1. The House met, at half-past two o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. STATEMENT BY MR. WATT WITH REFERENCE TO HIS RESIGNATION AS A MINISTER.—Mr. Watt asked for leave to make a statement with reference to his resignation, while in Europe, as Treasurer of the Commonwealth and Representative of the Government.

Leave of the House not being granted owing to there being dissentient voices-

Mr. Hughes moved, That so much of the Standing Orders be suspended as would preclude the honorable Member for Balaclava, the Prime Minister, the Leader of the Opposition, and the Leader of the Country Party from making statements to the House. Question—put.

The Chairman of Committees reported the circumstance to the House, and Mr. Speaker thereupon put the question-That the honorable Member for Darling (Mr. Blakeley) be suspended from the service of the House.

Mr. Speaker declared the question resolved in the affirmative.
