- 1. The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Acting-Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. ADJOURNMENT-MOTION FOR PURPOSE OF DISCUSSION.—Mr. Blakeley rose in his place, and said that he proposed to move the adjournment of the House for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely, "The depression of the Copper Market and its effect upon the Mining Industry".
 - Mr. Acting-Speaker thereupon called upon those Members who approved of the proposed discussion to rise in their places, and more than the necessary number of Members having risen accordingly—

Mr. Blakeley moved, That the House do now adjourn.

Debate ensued.

- Sir Joseph Cook, addressing the House, and not having, in compliance with Standing Order No. 39, concluded his speech within fifteen minutes, the honorable Member was, by leave of the House, allowed to continue his speech for ten minutes. Debate continued.
- It being two hours after the time fixed for the meeting of the House, the debate was interrupted in accordance with Standing Order No. 119, and the Business of the Day was called on.
- 3. WAYS AND MEANS [THE TARIFF].—The House, according to Order, resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.
