- No. 6.—Page 6, clause 24, line 26, leave out "Five hundred", insert "Two hundred and fifty'
- No. 7.—Page 6, clause 25, lines 37-39, leave out all the words after "penalty", insert "not exceeding Five hundred pounds or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months or both".
- No. 8.—Page 8, clause 34, line 6, leave out "Five hundred", insert "Two hundred and fifty". No. 9.—Page 8, clause 34, at end of clause add the following new sub-clause :-
 - "(3.) Any prosecution under this section shall be commenced within three months from the date of the commission of the alleged offence.".
- No. 10.—Page 8, after clause 36 add the following new clause :-
 - "37. This Act shall continue in force for a period of two years and no longer. Duration of Act.
