1 The House met, at three o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.--Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and read Prayers.

2. PAPERS. -The following Paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General-New Hebrides-Protocol respecting, signed at London, 6th August, 1914, by representatives of the

British and French Governments-(Ratifications exchanged at London, 18th March, 1922). Ordered to lie on the Table.

- 4. POSTPONEMENT OF BUSINESS .- Ordered That the intervening business be postponed until after Order of the Day No. 7.
- 5. DEFENCE (CIVIL EMPLOYMENT) BILL (1922) .- The Order of the Day having been read for the second reading-Mr. Groom moved, That the Bill be now read a second time. Question-put and passed.-Bill read a second time.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.

## (In the Committee.)

Bill agreed to, and to be reported without amendment.

The House resumed; Mr. Chanter reported accordingly. On the motion of Mr. Groom, the House adopted the Report, and, by leave, the Bill was read a third time.

6. ADJOURNMENT.-Mr. Hughes moved, That the House do now adjourn. Question—put and passed.

And then the House, at ten minutes to eleven o'clock p.m., adjourned until to-morrow at half-past two o'clock p.m.
