- 3. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT-SUGAR-ROYAL COMMISSION TO INVESTIGATE CERTAIN PURCHASES. Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to the Com-missioner (Sir Edward Mitchell, K.C.M.G., K.C.,) to be appointed to inquire into certain purchases of sugar. (See p. 117 ante). By leave Mr. Edward Riley asked a question in connexion with the matter, and was replied to by
 - Mr. Bruce.
- 4. RIVER MURRAY WATERS BILL (1923) .- Mr. Stewart (Minister for Works and Railways) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to ratify an Agreement for the Variation of the Agreement entered into between the Prime Minister of the Commonwealth and the Premiers of the States of New South Wales, Victoria, and South Australia, respecting the River Murray and Lake Victoria and other Waters, and for other purposes. Question-put and passed.
- 5. POST AND TELEGRAPH RATES BILL (1923).—Mr. Gibson (Postmaster-General) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act to amend the Post and Telegraph Rates Act 1902-1920.
