- 2. IMPERIAL AND ECONOMIC CONFERENCES, 1923—MOTION FOR PRINTING PAPERS AND APPROVING RESOLUTIONS.—The Order of the Day having been read for the resumption of the debate on the following motion of Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister):—
 - (1) That the Summary of Proceedings of the Imperial Conference 1923, and the Resolutions of the Imperial Economic Conference 1923 [Papers presented on the 27th instant], be printed.
 - (2) That this House approves of the conclusions of the Imperial Conference, as set out in the Summary of Proceedings, relating to—

(a) Foreign Relations;

(b) Negotiation, Signature and Ratification of Treaties;

(c) Defence.

(3) That this House approves of the Resolutions of the Imperial Economic Conference relating to—

(a) Imperial Preference;

(b) Imperial Economic Committee—

and on the Amendment moved thereto by Mr. Charlton (Leader of the Opposition), viz.:—That all the words after the first word "That" in paragraph (2) be omitted, with a view to the insertion of the following words in place thereof:—"this House approves of the foreign policy of His Majesty's Government in Great Britain, as indorsed by a majority of the representatives of the British people in the House of Commons, aiming as such policy does to bring about goodwill between nations and advance the peace of the world"—

3. Message from the Deputy of the Governor-General.—Naval Construction Bill.—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor-General's Deputy was presented, and the same was read by Mr. Speaker:—

Deputy of the Governor-General.

Message No. 30.

In accordance with the requirements of section 56 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia, the Deputy of the Governor-General recommends to the House of Representatives that an appropriation of revenue be made for the purposes of a Bill for an Act to grant and apply out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund the sum of One million five hundred thousand pounds for Naval Construction.
