- 1. The House met, at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Right Honorable W. A. Watt) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. Joint Committee of Public Accounts—Report.—Mr. Fenton, Vice-Chairman of the Joint Committee of Public Accounts, brought up the following Report from the Committee:—

Certain transactions between the Co-operative Estates Limited, of Hobart, and the War Service Homes Commission.

Ordered to be printed.

- ALTERATION OF DAY OF NEXT MEETING.—Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister) moved, That the House, at its rising, adjourn until Monday next at three o'clock p.m. Debate ensued.
   Question—put and passed.
- 4. Paper.—The following Paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General—

  Central Australia—Report of Committee of Representatives of the Commonwealth and of South Australia, on the nature of the country between Kingoonya (South Australia) and Alice Springs (Northern Territory).

Ordered to lie on the Table.

5. War-time Profits Tax Assessment Bill (1924).—Mr. Earle Page (Treasurer) moved, pursuant to notice, That he have leave to bring in a Bill for an Act relating to certain Assessments of War-time Profits.

Question—put and passed.

Mr. Earle Page then brought up the Bill accordingly, and moved, That it be now read a first time.
