- 1. The House met, at three o'clock p.m., pursuant to adjournment.—Mr. Speaker (the Right Honorable W. A. Watt) took the Chair, and read Prayers.
- 2. MINISTERIAL STATEMENT—LEAGUE OF NATIONS .-- Mr. Bruce (Prime Minister), by leave, made a Ministerial Statement with reference to the inclusion of Mrs. R. R. S. Mackinnon on the Australian Delegation at the forthcoming meeting of the League of Nations.
- 3. PAPERS .-- The following Paper was presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor-General:-

Papuan Oilfields-Report for May, 1925, of the Commonwealth Representative. Ordered to lie on the Table.

 - (1) Construction of Sewage Treatment Works, Federal Capital.
 - (2) Construction of Northern Main Intercepting Sewer, Canberra.
