Australian Security Intelligence Organisation Legislation Amendment (Terrorism) Bill 2002–(11 Opposition (2 amended by 2 Australian Democrat), and 8 Government (3 amended by 7 Opposition) amendments agreed to) [The House of Representatives agreed to 15 amendments, disagreed to 35 amendments, and made 14 substitute amendments in place of 8 Senate amendments. The Senate insisted on the amendments disagreed to by the House. The House agreed to 3 amendments insisted on by the Senate, insisted on disagreeing to 40 amendments insisted on by the Senate, insisted on 5 and did not insist on 9 substitute amendments. The Senate further insisted on the amendments disagreed to by the House. The House will now reconsider the amendments further insisted on by the Senate.]

- □ Family and Community Services Legislation Amendment (Special Benefit Activity Test) Bill 2002–(2 Opposition, and 2 Australian Democrat <u>amendments agreed to</u>) [The House of Representatives agreed to the amendments made by the Senate. The bill will now be assented to.]
- □ Inspector-General of Taxation Bill 2002–(9 Australian Democrat <u>amendments</u> <u>agreed to</u>) [The House of Representatives will now consider the amendments made by the Senate]
- □ Renewable Energy (Electricity) Amendment Bill 2002–(2 Opposition <u>amendments</u> <u>agreed to</u>) [The House of Representatives will now consider the amendments made by the Senate]
- □ Trade Practices Amendment (Liability for Recreational Services) Bill 2002– (1 Opposition (amended by 1 Opposition), and 4 Australian Democrat <u>amendments</u> <u>agreed to</u>) [The House of Representatives disagreed to the Senate amendments. The Senate did not insist on the amendments disagreed to by the House. The bill will now be assented to]
- □ Workplace Relations Amendment (Fair Termination) Bill 2002–(2 Opposition, and 3 Australian Democrat <u>amendments agreed to</u>) [The House of Representatives will now consider the amendments made by the Senate]

The following message from the House of Representatives was reported

□ Plant Breeder's Rights Amendment Bill 2002—<u>The message</u> reported that the House of Representatives agreed to the bill without amendment [The bill will now be assented to]

The following messages from the House of Representatives were considered

- □ Family and Community Services Legislation Amendment (Australians Working Together and other 2001 Budget Measures) Bill (No. 2) 2002–The message (reported on 5 December) reported that the House of Representatives requested the Senate to reconsider the bill in its original form. The Senate agreed not to insist on dividing the bill, made amendments (55 Opposition and 16 Australian Democrat) and agreed to the bill. [The House of Representatives agreed to 5 amendments, disagreed to 41 amendments, and made 48 substitute amendments in place of 48 Senate amendments. The Senate insisted on the amendments disagreed to by the House, insisted on 20 amendments disagreed by the House, and agreed to the substitute amendments. The House will now reconsider the amendments disagreed to by the Senate.]
- □ Prohibition of Human Cloning Bill 2002—<u>The message</u> reported that the House of Representatives had agreed to the <u>amendments made by the Senate</u> [The bill will now be assented to]
- □ Research Involving Human Embryos Bill 2002—<u>The message</u> reported that the House of Representatives had agreed to the <u>amendments made by the Senate</u> [The bill will now be assented to]
- □ Taxation Laws Amendment (Structured Settlements and Structured Orders) Bill 2002–The message (reported on 11 December) reported that the House of Representatives agreed to 62 and disagreed to 2 amendments made by the Senate.
