□ The Senate <u>ordered</u> the Minister for Revenue and Assistant Treasurer to table the document detailing the actual total revenue collected during the 2002-03 financial year from the measure "allowing departing temporary residents access to their superannuation" referred to on pages 1 to 25 of the document *Budget strategy and outlook 2002-03* (Budget Paper No. 1) (no later than 5pm on 24 March 2004)—moved by Senator Sherry. The Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry <u>made a statement</u> later in the day indicating that the Government would not comply with the order.

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□ The Senate <u>ordered</u> the Leader of the Government in the Senate to table copies of all drafts of the clarifying statement which was negotiated between the Australian Federal Police Commissioner, Mr Keelty, and the Secretary of the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, Dr Shergold, and any other members or representatives of the Government and which was issued by the Commissioner on Tuesday 16 March 2004 (no later than 4pm on 30 March 2004)—moved by Senator Faulkner
