Energy Grants (Cleaner Fuels) Scheme Bill 2003–11 Government <u>amendments</u> agreed to [The House of Representatives will now consider the amendments made by the Senate]

Military Rehabilitation and Compensation (Consequential and Transitional Provisions) Bill 2003–A message reported that the House of Representatives had made the <u>amendments</u> requested by the Senate [The House will now consider the amendments made by the Senate]

Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry Legislation Amendment Bill (No. 2) 2003–The message reported that the House of Representatives had disagreed to the <u>amendments</u> made by the Senate and had made amendments in place of those amendments [The Senate will reconsider the amendments disagreed to by the House, and the amendments made in place of those amendments, on a future sitting day]

The following messages from the House of Representatives were considered

- Family Assistance Legislation Amendment (Extension of Time Limits) Bill 2003– the message reported that the House of Representatives had not made the <u>amendments</u> requested by the Senate. The Senate resolved not to further press its requests for amendments not made by the House. [The bill will now be assented to]
- Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Bill 2003–The message reported that the House of Representatives had made <u>amendments</u> nos 2 to 8 requested by the Senate, and had not made amendment no. 1. The Senate resolved not to press its request for the amendment to which the House had disagreed. [The bill will now be assented to]
- Superannuation Safety Amendment Bill 2003–The message reported that the House of Representatives had agreed to 37 <u>amendments</u> made by the Senate, and disagreed to 2. The Senate did not insist on the <u>amendments</u> to which the House had disagreed. [The bill will now be assented to]
