Notice given 13 May 2008

1 Senator Siewert: To move—That—

- (1) The Senate notes the continuing decline and extinction of a significant proportion of Australia's unique plants and animals, and the likelihood that accelerating climate change will exacerbate challenges faced by Australian species.
- (2) The following matter be referred to the Environment, Communications and the Arts Committee for inquiry and report by 27 November 2008:

The operation of the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* (EPBC Act), with particular reference to:

- (a) the need for legislative reform as a result of the findings of the Australian National Audit Office, Audit report no. 38 of 2002-03, Referrals, Assessments and Approvals under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999;
- (b) the effectiveness of the EPBC Act to protect critical habitats of threatened species and ecological communities, and the potential for measures to improve their recovery;
- (c) the cumulative impacts of EPBC Act approvals on threatened species and ecological communities, for example on Cumberland Plain Woodland, Cassowary habitat and Grassy White Box Woodlands;
- (d) the effectiveness of past government responses to key threats identified within the EPBC Act, including land-clearing, climate change and invasive species, and potential for future measures to build environmental resilience and facilitate adaptation within a changing climate;
- (e) lessons learnt from the first 10 years of operation of the EPBC Act;
- (f) the effectiveness of Regional Forest Agreements, in protecting forest species and forest habitats where the EPBC Act does not directly apply.

2 Leader of the Australian Democrats (Senator Allison) and Senator Murray: To move—

- (1) That the Senate—
 - (a) notes the report by CHOICE on charities, published online in March 2008, that highlights the wide variability and inconsistency in the way that charities disclose information to the public; and
 - (b) acknowledges that the 27 recommendations from the inquiry into the definition of charities and related organisations, which reported in 2001, have not been implemented.

- (2) That the following matters be referred to the Economics Committee for inquiry and report by the last sitting day of November 2008:
 - (a) to investigate the relevance and appropriateness of current disclosure regimes for charities and all other not-for-profit organisations;
 - (b) to identify models of regulation and legal forms that would improve governance and management of charities and not-for-profit organisations and cater for emerging social enterprises; and
 - (c) to identify other measures that can be taken by government and the not-for-profit sector to assist the sector to improve governance, standards, accountability and transparency in its use of public and government funds.

 - (b) any related bill or bills that may be introduced to give effect to the recommendations of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission's report Same Sex: Same Entitlements, dated May 2007, also be referred to the Legal and Constitutional Affairs Committee for inquiry and report together with the following matters:
 - (i) the definition of 'couple relationship',
 - (ii) empirical evidence from the states concerning the existence, recognition and relative numbers of interdependent relationships, other than de facto (whether heterosexual or same-sex) and marital relationships,
 - (iii) whether the definition of 'couple relationship' should be amended to incorporate other interdependent relationships and, if so, whether the definitions should be broadened to include those relationships or whether a separate definition is required,
 - (iv) the fiscal implications of the statutory recognition of other interdependent relationships for superannuation and taxation purposes,

- (v) the definitions of 'child' and 'child of a couple relationship',
- (vi) the legal and fiscal implications of the definitions referred to in (v), particularly as they relate to the rights, obligations and liabilities of co-parents (i.e., the parent in a couple relationship that does not have a biological connection to a child of that relationship), and
- (vii) all other matters considered necessary by the committee.
- (2) That the committee is not to conclude its consideration of the matter contained in subparagraph (1)(a) until it has concluded its consideration of the matters in subparagraph (1)(b).
- (3) That the committee must hear evidence, inter alia, from:
 - (a) the Attorney-General's Department;
 - (b) the Department of Finance and Deregulation;
 - (c) the Relationship Registries of Tasmania, Victoria and the Australian Capital Territory;
 - (d) the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission; and
 - (e) the Law Council of Australia (Family Law Section).

No. 2—

- (1) That the Tax Laws Amendment (Medicare Levy Surcharge Thresholds) Bill 2008 be referred to the Economics Committee for inquiry and report not before 26 August 2008, together with the following matters:
 - (a) the impact of changes to the thresholds on the number of Australians with private health insurance (PHI), including an examination of how many will abandon their policies as a result and how many will not take up PHI in the future;
 - (b) the modelling underpinning the decision and the veracity of that modelling;
 - (c) the anticipated impact on PHI premiums and PHI products offered;
 - (d) the impact of the change on the cost of living and the consumer price index;
 - (e) including the threshold, PHI rebate and lifetime health cover on increasing PHI membership;
 - (f) the anticipated impact of changes to the threshold on:
 - (i) the public hospital system including waiting lists and the financial requirements of state governments,
 - (ii) the ongoing viability of PHI, and
 - (iii) private hospitals.
- (2) That the inquiry hear evidence in all capital cities and from, inter alia, the private health insurance sector about the impact of the measures in the bill on the industry and on the public hospital system.

No. 3—

(1) That the National Health Amendment (Pharmaceutical and Other Benefits—Cost Recovery) Bill 2008 be referred to the Community Affairs Committee for inquiry and report not before 18 August 2008, together with the following matters:

- (a) the impact of the Pharmaceutical Benefit Scheme (PBS) cost recovery on:
 - (i) patients' timely and affordable access to medicines,
 - (ii) the Australian pharmaceutical industry,
 - (iii) new products and innovation, and
 - (iv) the independence of the Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee;
- (b) cost recovery mechanisms in other countries;
- (c) how cost recovery will improve the timeliness and effectiveness of the current PBS process for listing new medicines; and
- (d) the modelling and consultation underpinning the decision.
- (2) That, in conducting its inquiry, the committee hear evidence, inter alia, from the pharmaceutical industry, generic medicines industry, consumer and patient health groups, the Department of Health and Ageing, the PBS Evaluation Units and the Australian Medical Association and other medical bodies.

No. 4—

(1) That the following bills:

Tax Laws Amendment (Luxury Car Tax) Bill 2008

A New Tax System (Luxury Car Tax Imposition—General) Amendment Bill 2008

A New Tax System (Luxury Car Tax Imposition—Customs) Amendment Bill 2008 and

be referred to the Economics Committee for inquiry and report not before 26 August 2008, together with the following matters:

- (a) the incidence of the luxury car tax (LCT) and the effect of the proposed increase in the LCT rate on rural and regional communities, small business families and tourism operators;
- (b) the effect of the LCT increase on the prices of vehicles, the affordability of motor vehicles, the cost of living, and the consumer price index (CPI);
- (c) the expected impact of the increase in the LCT rate on vehicle demand and the likely consequences for government revenues including from the LCT, goods and services tax (GST) and stamp duty;
- (d) the growing incidence of the LCT over time and the adequacy of current arrangements for indexation of the LCT threshold, in comparison with alternative measures including the CPI, average weekly earnings and the increase in the retail price of motor vehicles;
- (e) the rationale for taxing 'luxury' cars at a higher rate than other goods and services;
- (f) the effect of the LCT and the proposed increase in the LCT rate on Australian vehicle manufacturers and vehicle importers and distributors;

- (g) the overall taxation burden on ownership and operation of motor vehicles including customs duty, GST, LCT stamp duty and excise on fuel:
- (h) the effect of the LCT and the proposed increase in the LCT rate on the adoption of vehicle safety features and environmental technologies; and
- (i) the extent to which the LCT is viewed as a non-tariff barrier by other car exporting countries.

(2) That:

- (a) as a minimum, the committee hold hearings in Melbourne and Adelaide and hear evidence, inter alia, from Australia's vehicle manufacturers, importers and distributors as well as from the Federal Chamber of Automotive Industries, the Australian Automobile Association, the Motor Trades Association of Australia, the Victorian Automobile Chamber of Commerce, the Motor Trades Association of Queensland and the tourism industry; and
- (b) the committee also take into account submissions to, and recommendations of, the Bracks' Review of Australia's Automotive Industry.

No. 5—

- (1) That the Excise Legislation Amendment (Condensate) Bill 2008 and the Excise Tariff Amendment (Condensate) Bill 2008 be referred to the Economics Committee for inquiry and report not before 26 August 2008, together with the following matters:
 - (a) the impact of the changes on retail prices of domestic gas and electricity in Western Australia, and any consequent effect on consumer prices;
 - (b) the impact of the decision on the industry generally and on the exploration for petroleum products in Australia; and
 - (c) the impact of the decision, and the decision-making process, on domestic and international investment confidence in Australia.
- (2) That the committee must conduct hearings in Western Australia and hear evidence from, inter alia, industry bodies and joint venture partners on the North West Shelf.

No. 6—

- (1) That the National Fuelwatch (Empowering Consumers) Bill 2008 and the National Fuelwatch (Empowering Consumers) (Consequential Amendments) Bill 2008 be referred to the Economics Committee for inquiry and report not before 29 September 2008, together with the following matters:
 - (a) the impact of the proposed Fuelwatch scheme on the price consumers will pay for motor fuel (including unleaded petrol, diesel and LPG) in metropolitan areas, regional centres and rural Australia:
 - (b) the economic benefits and costs of the proposed Fuelwatch scheme to consumers in metropolitan areas, regional centres and rural Australia;
 - (c) other economic costs of the proposed Fuelwatch scheme, including the compliance costs of the scheme for industry, particularly independent retailers;

- (d) the impact of the proposed Fuelwatch scheme on competition between motor fuel retailers and the operation and viability of independent motor fuel retailers;
- (e) intraday price volatility in the retail market, established price cycles in each state and territory, and consumer awareness of price cycles;
- (f) the impact of Fuelwatch on discounting, as well as the amplitude and duration of price cycles, including any penalties that will apply to motor fuel retailers for not fixing prices for 24 hour periods;
- (g) the potential use under the Fuelwatch scheme of sophisticated pricing strategies by motor fuel retailers who have more than one retail outlet, and how they may take advantage of the 24 hour rule;
- (h) independent analysis of the overall economic benefits and costs of the proposed Fuelwatch scheme;
- (i) independent analysis of the differences in motor fuel prices between Western Australia and other Australian states and territories, with particular reference to volumetric or consumption-weighted prices;
 and
- (j) the legal basis for the legislation.
- (2) That, in conducting its inquiry, the committee:
 - (a) hear evidence in all capital cities and in such major rural and regional centres as may be determined by the committee; and
 - (b) hear evidence, inter alia, from independent retailers, motoring bodies with knowledge of the retail motor fuel market, business organisations with an interest in motor fuel prices and independent think tanks and economists who have knowledge of retail pricing arrangements in the motor fuel industry.

 - (vi) there is a real danger that we have reached or will soon reach critical tipping points and the future will be taken out of our hands – the melting Arctic sea ice could be the first such tipping point,
 - (vii) beyond 2°C of warming seems inevitable, unless greenhouse gas reduction targets are tightened, and we risk huge human and societal costs, and perhaps even the effective end of industrial civilisation,
 - (viii) we need to cease our assault on our own life support system and that of millions of species, and that global warming is only one of many symptoms of that assault,
 - (ix) peak oil, global warming and long-term sustainability pressures all require that we reduce energy needs and switch to renewable energy sources and many credible studies show that Australia can quickly and cost-effectively reduce greenhouse gas emissions through dramatic improvements in energy efficiency and by increasing Australia's investment in solar, wind and other renewable sources,

- (x) the need for action is extremely urgent and the window of opportunity for avoiding severe impacts is rapidly closing, yet the obstacles to change are not technical or economic, they are political and social, and
- (xi) democratic societies have responded successfully to dire and immediate threats, as was demonstrated in World War II and this is a last call for an effective response to global warming;
- (b) thanks the delegates of this conference, including Professor Barry Brook, Sir Hubert Wilkins, Dr Geoff Davies, Dr Andrew Glikson and Mr Sebastian Clark for their efforts in drawing this warning to the Senate's attention; and

- (30) (a) Why did the department agree to vary the guidelines for the TCFA grants from other forest-related industry proposal guidelines; (b) in particular, what is the reason detailed financial information on other sources of government funding was excluded; and (c) who requested the variation and what was the rationale provided.
- (31) Who has taken responsibility for advising the Minister or the Government when the department did not adhere to its 'Chief Executive Instruction on Grant Management' in relation to good eligibility criteria and method and scale of rating applications.

- (33) Did the chair of the advisory committee document what she or he believed the 'intent' of the programs was since the criteria had been ignored; if not, why not.
- (34) Which grant application for \$49 950 had only a Department of Economic Development (DED) assessment.
- (35) (a) Which six grant applications under \$50 000 had no documented assessment covering financial viability on technical or operational viability; (b) were they approved; (c) what advice did the department provide to the Ministers as to whether or not they should be approved and on what basis; and (d) who takes responsibility for this advice.
- (36) (a) Why did the advisory committee decide not to continue with a probity advisor after only one meeting with a probity advisor present; (b) did the department inform either the Tasmanian Government or Federal Government that the advisory committee had dispensed with the services of a probity advisor; if not, why not.
- (37) (a) How many, and which, DED staff provide extensive support to applicants through the secretariat of the advisory committee; and (b) who invited, or agreed to, the DED having such a role when this role was not identified or formalised in the memorandum of understanding on exchange of letters between the state and Commonwealth governments.

- (38) Was any assessment conducted of any conflicts of interest of these DED officers, since they undertook assessment of some applications.
- (39) Which individuals or companies were recipients of: (a) Tasmanian Country Sawmills Association Programme (TCSAP) 2, worth \$102 585; and (b) Tasmanian Softwood Development Programme (TSIDP) 23(a), worth \$68 312.

- (3) What options are under consideration for allocating emission liabilities from clearing native vegetation and crediting CO₂ uptake through regrowth in an emissions trading scheme.
- (4) What measures other than emissions trading are under consideration to eliminate emissions from native vegetation clearing.

- (5) In regards to emissions from 'Forest Land remaining Forest Land' (United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change accounting) can a breakdown be provided of emissions of each subsector for each year since 1990, by each state.
- *500 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister for Climate Change and Water—With reference to the Land-based Sector Consultative group (www.greenhouse.gov.au/emissionstrading/consultation.html):
 - (1) Who are the members of the group, including their names, and what is their organisation affiliation and expertise.
 - (2) Do the members of the group represent organisations or are they appointed because of their expertise.
 - (3) What are the group's terms of reference and role.
 - (4) Can a copy of the minutes of the group's meeting on 19 May 2008 and documents tabled at that meeting, other than those on the web page, be provided.
 - (5) Why is 'forestry' defined as a sector rather than 'land use, land-use change and forestry'.
 - (6) What is the precise definition of the 'forestry' sector for the purposes of emissions trading and other proposed mitigation measures.
 - (7) What consultation has been organised or is proposed for land uses other than agriculture and forestry with particular reference to those relating to the protection, management and restoration of native vegetation for conservation, cultural and amenity purposes (all of which are 'anthropogenic' under the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change rules).
- *501 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister representing the Minister for Resources and Energy—
 - (1) Does the current Labor Government's Uranium Industry Framework (UIF) differ in structure and function from that under the previous Government; if so, can an outline be provided of any differences and any changes to the terms of reference.
 - (2) (a) What is the UIF panel membership; and (b) does it differ to that under the previous Government.
 - (3) Is the UIF working directly with the Department of Environment, Water Heritage and the Arts and/or expert independent environmental scientists to ensure environmental protection measures are considered in all decision-making.
 - (4) With reference to a paper dated 20 March 2006, circulated within the Australian Labor Party and to unions, in which Mr Martin Ferguson stated 'Australia has the opportunity to lead the world as a responsible supplier of uranium for peaceful purposes', by among other things 'stewarding uranium from cradle to grave': (a) is the Government proposing to steward uranium from cradle to grave; and (b) does this mean Australia is going to accept nuclear waste produced in overseas nuclear power reactors which use uranium originally sourced from Australian uranium.

- *502 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister for Climate Change and Water—In response to questions from Senator Milne on 29 May 2008 during an estimates hearing of the Finance and Public Administration Committee, Mr Carruthers said 'Under the international guidelines for national inventory reporting produced by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, biomass waste is treated as a zero emission. The emission is calculated to have occurred back in the forest':
 - (1) Does Australia follow the international guidelines for national inventory reporting of forestry operations; if not, why not.
 - (2) What was the carbon content of logs harvested in 2005 and 2006 from: (a) native forests; (b) hardwood plantations; and (c) softwood plantations.
 - (3) Where in Australia's national inventory report is the carbon in (2) reported.
- *503 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister representing the Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government—With reference to the Esperance Coast Road Upgrade:
 - (1) Has the Government allocated money from the Roads to Recovery Scheme for the upgrade.
 - (2) In relation to the Auslinks Strategic Regional Programme, on what basis was the funding allocated for this project.
 - (3) Was the Government aware that the traffic count for the Esperance Coast Road was 185 vehicles per day.
 - (4) How many development applications for boundary adjustments were required.
 - (5) Were all the required planning processes carried out by the Huon Valley Council (HVC) prior to commencement of work.
 - (6) Were reports on the planning process sent to the Government as part of the acquittal process.
 - (7) What was the number of land acquisitions, including Crown Land, required for the construction of the Esperance Coast Road.
 - (8) Given expenditure on the project to 30 April 2008 by HVC was \$2 416 742.20, with total funds available of \$3 437 933.89, including \$400 000 from 2007-08 federal assistance grants: was federal funding for the project \$3 200 000 or \$2 800 000.
 - (9) Was a report submitted to the Government by the HVC outlining how the project up to Surveyors Bay was completed within budget through the daily hire of plants from local contractors and HVC staff.

6 Unauthorised disclosure of committee proceedings

That the following order operate as an order of continuing effect:

- (1) The Senate confirms that any disclosure of evidence or documents submitted to a committee, of documents prepared by a committee, or of deliberations of a committee, without the approval of the committee or of the Senate, may be treated by the Senate as a contempt.
- (2) The Senate reaffirms its resolution of 20 June 1996, relating to procedures to be followed by committees in cases of unauthorised disclosure of committee proceedings.
- (3) The Senate provides the following guidelines to be observed by committees in applying that resolution, and declares that the Senate will observe the guidelines in determining whether to refer a matter to the Committee of Privileges:

- 1. Unless there are particular circumstances involving actual or potential substantial interference with the work of a committee or of the Senate, the following kinds of unauthorised disclosure should not be raised as matters of privilege:
 - (a) disclosure of a committee report in the time between the substantial conclusion of the committee's deliberations on the report and its presentation to the Senate;
 - (b) disclosure of other documents prepared by a committee and not published by the committee, where the committee would have published them, or could appropriately have published them, in any event, or where they contain only research or publicly-available material, or where their disclosure is otherwise inconsequential;
 - (c) disclosure of documents and evidence submitted to a committee and not published by the committee, where the committee would have published them, or could appropriately have published them, in any event;
 - (d) disclosure of private deliberations of a committee where the freedom of the committee to deliberate is unlikely to be significantly affected.
- 2. The following kinds of unauthorised disclosure are those for which the contempt jurisdiction of the Senate should primarily be reserved, and which should therefore be raised as matters of privilege:
 - (a) disclosure of documents or evidence submitted to a committee where the committee has deliberately decided to treat the documents or evidence as in camera material, for the protection of witnesses or others, or because disclosure would otherwise be harmful to the public interest;
 - (b) disclosure of documents prepared by a committee where that involves disclosure of material of the kind specified in paragraph (a);
 - (c) disclosure of private deliberations of a committee where that involves disclosure of that kind of material, or significantly impedes the committee's freedom to deliberate.
- 3. An unauthorised disclosure not falling into the categories in guidelines 1 and 2 should not be raised as a matter of privilege unless it involves actual or potential substantial interference with the work of a committee or of the Senate.
- 4. When considering any unauthorised disclosure of material in the possession of a committee, the committee should consider whether there was any substantive reason for not publishing that material.
- (4) Before deciding to raise a matter of privilege involving possible unauthorised disclosure of committee proceedings, any committee may seek the guidance of the Committee of Privileges as to whether a matter should be pursued. If the committee decides that such a matter should be raised, it must consult with the Committee of Privileges before taking the matter further.

(5) When applying this resolution a committee shall have regard to the matters set out in paragraphs 3.43 to 3.59 of the 122nd Report of the Committee of Privileges, June 2005.

(Sessional order agreed to on 6 October 2005 adopted as an order of continuing effect on 17 September 2007.)

7 Substitute members of committees—Temporary order

GUIDE TO THE NOTICE PAPER

The *Notice Paper* is issued each sitting day and contains details of current business before the Senate. Its structure is based on four main types of business, as follows:

Matters of privilege take precedence over all other business and are listed at the beginning of the *Notice Paper* when they arise. They consist of notices of motion which the President has determined warrant such precedence and any orders relating to adjourned debates on such motions.

Business of the Senate has precedence over government and general business for the day on which it is listed. It includes disallowance motions, orders of the day for the presentation of committee reports, motions to refer matters to standing committees, motions for leave of absence for a senator and motions concerning the qualification of a senator

Government business is business initiated by a minister including the consideration of government legislation. It takes precedence over general business except for a period of 2½ hours each week set aside on Thursdays for general business.

General business is all other business initiated by senators who are not ministers. It takes precedence over government business only as described above.

Within each of these categories, business consists of notices of motion and orders of the day:

Notices of motion are statements that senators intend to move particular motions on the days indicated. They are entered on the *Notice Paper* in the order given and may be given jointly by two or more senators. Notices of motion are usually considered before orders of the day.

Orders of the day are items of business which the Senate has ordered to be considered on particular days, usually arising from adjourned debates on matters (including legislation) or requirements to present committee reports.

On days other than Thursdays, the *Notice Paper* records all business of the Senate and government business items, but includes only new items of general business from the previous sitting day. On Thursdays, business relating to the consideration of government documents, committee reports and government responses to committee reports is also published.

Other sections in the *Notice Paper* are as follows:

Orders of the day relating to committee reports and government responses—adjourned debates on motions to consider or adopt committee reports and government responses. These orders may be considered for one hour on Thursdays at the conclusion of general business. New items appear on the following day's *Notice Paper*. The section is printed in full on Thursdays.

Orders of the day relating to government documents—adjourned debates on motions to take note of government documents. Such orders arise from consideration of the government documents presented on a particular day and include consideration of any documents not reached on the day. They are also listed for consideration for up to one hour on Thursdays during the consideration of general business. New items appear in the following day's *Notice Paper*. The section is printed in full on Thursdays.

Business for future consideration lists any notice of motion or order of the day to be considered on a specific day in the future; for example, a committee report ordered to be presented on a specific date, or a notice of motion given for a day other than the next day of sitting.

Bills referred to committees lists all bills or provisions of bills currently being considered by committees.

Questions on notice includes the text of new questions on notice and lists the numbers of unanswered questions.

Orders of the Senate includes orders of short-term duration such as orders for production of documents and those relating to days of sitting for a period of sittings.

Contingent notices of motion are statements of intention by senators that, contingent on a specified occurrence, they may move a motion, usually to suspend standing orders. They are grouped by subject.

Temporary chairs of committees is a daily list of all senators appointed to take the chair in the absence of the President or Deputy President.

Categories of committees is a daily list, categorised by type, of Senate and joint committees. Details of each committee appear in the committee section.

Committees lists all of Senate and joint committees, including membership, current inquiries and reports presented on or since the previous sitting day.

Senate appointments to statutory authorities lists the statutory authorities on which the Senate is represented and details of representation.

Ministerial representation lists Senate ministers and the portfolios they represent.

The 'full' Notice Paper

On the first day of the autumn and spring sittings a full *Notice Paper* is printed listing all outstanding business before the Senate, including the full text of all unresolved notices of motion and unanswered questions on notice. This edition is a complete reference to unresolved business from earlier in the session and is useful to keep. All business before the Senate is published daily in the full online version of the *Notice Paper*, available on ParlInfo and at: www.aph.gov.au/senate/work/notice/index.htm
