- (a) notes that in October 2008, 13-year-old Aisha Ibrahim Duhulow was stoned to death for adultery in Kismayo, Somalia, by 50 men in front of 1 000 spectators, after her father reported she had been raped by three men, none of whom were arrested;
- (b) expresses profound distress at this barbaric act against a child;
- (c) condemns the Al-Shabaab militia rebels who arranged the stoning; and
- (d) backs international action to restore peace and human dignity to Somalia.
- *275 **Leader of the Australian Greens (Senator Bob Brown):** To move—That the Senate calls on the Government to develop a white paper on population during this period of government which takes into account:
 - (a) projections of a global population of between 9 to 10 billion people by 2050;
 - (b) the inability of the Earth to provide for 9 to 10 billion people if average resource consumption is to be at current levels in Australia;
 - (c) climate change;
 - (d) Australia's inability to host exponential population growth; and
 - (e) the wellbeing of future generations and life on Earth.

*276 **Senator Bernardi:** To move—

- (1) That a select committee, to be known as the Select Committee on Men's Health, be established to inquire into and report by 30 May 2009 on: General issues related to the availability and effectiveness of education, supports and services for men's health, including but not limited to:
 - (i) level of Commonwealth, state and other funding addressing men's health, particularly prostate cancer, testicular cancer, and depression,
 - (ii) adequacy of existing education and awareness campaigns regarding men's health for both men and the wider community,
 - (iii) prevailing attitudes of men towards their own health and sense of wellbeing and how these are affecting men's health in general, and
 - (iv) the extent, funding and adequacy for treatment services and general support programs for men's health in metropolitan, rural, regional and remote areas.
- (2) That the committee consist of 7 senators, 2 nominated by the Leader of the Government in the Senate, 4 nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate, and 1 nominated by any minority party or independent senators.
- (3) (a) Participating members may be appointed to the committee on the nominations of the Leader of the Government in the Senate, the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate or any minority party or independent senator;
 - (b) participating members may participate in hearings of evidence and deliberations of the committee, and have all the rights of members of the committee, but may not vote on any questions before the committee; and

- (c) a participating member shall be taken to be a member of the committee for the purpose of forming a quorum of the committee if a majority of members of the committee is not present.
- (4) That the committee may proceed to the dispatch of business notwithstanding that all members have not been duly nominated and appointed and notwithstanding any vacancy.
- (5) That the committee elect as chair one of the members nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate.
- (6) That the chair of the committee may, from time to time, appoint another member of the committee to be the deputy chair of the committee, and that the member so appointed act as chair of the committee at any time when there is no chair or the chair is not present at a meeting of the committee.
- (7) That, in the event of an equally divided vote, the chair, or the deputy chair when acting as chair, have a casting vote.
- (8) That the committee have power to appoint subcommittees consisting of 3 or more of its members and to refer to any such subcommittee any of the matters which the committee is empowered to examine.
- (9) That the committee and any subcommittee have power to send for and examine persons and documents, to move from place to place, to sit in public or in private, notwithstanding any prorogation of the Parliament or dissolution of the House of Representatives, and have leave to report from time to time its proceedings, the evidence taken and such interim recommendations as it may deem fit.
- (10) That the committee be provided with all necessary staff, facilities and resources and be empowered to appoint persons with specialist knowledge for the purposes of the committee with the approval of the President.
- (11) That the committee be empowered to print from day to day such documents and evidence as may be ordered by it, and a daily Hansard be published of such proceedings as take place in public.

*277 **Senator Hanson-Young:** To move—That the Senate—

- (a) notes that:
 - (i) Thursday, 20 November 2008, marks the 10th International Transgender Day of Remembrance, and
 - (ii) this day of action was established as a reminder of those who have been killed as a result of anti-gendered hatred or prejudice; and
- (b) recognises the work of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission in their consultation with the sex and gender diverse community in how they can assist in promoting and protecting the human rights of people who are transgender, transsexual or intersex.

*278 **Senators Barnett and Wortley:** To move—That the Senate—

- (a) notes that:
 - (i) on 20 December 2006, a landmark decision was made by the United Nations General Assembly to adopt Resolution 61/225,
 - (ii) the resolution recognised the risks that diabetes and its complications pose to families, member states and world health and was adopted by consensus,
 - (iii) the resolution declared 14 November as World Diabetes Day,

- (iv) this resolution joins HIV/AIDS and autism as the only other diseases having its own resolution and declared day of observation,
- (v) an estimated 246 million people aged between 20 and 79 worldwide have diabetes and this number is expected to grow by 44 per cent reaching 380 million by 2025,
- (vi) each year 3.8 million adults die from diabetes-related illnesses, representing one death every 10 seconds,
- (vii) an estimated 7.4 per cent of the Australian population has diabetes, according to the Australian Diabetes, Obesity and Lifestyle (AusDiab) study in 2000, and
- (viii) according to an AusDiab study the social and medical costs in Australia were estimated in 2002 to total \$6 billion annually;
- (b) acknowledges the work of Professor Martin Silink, AM, MD, FRACP, as President of the International Diabetes Federation and his colleagues worldwide for their work to ensure that this united resolution was carried;
- (c) recognises that:
 - (i) in the catalogue of chronic illness few conditions would be more needful of attention than the scourge of diabetes,
 - (ii) the prevention and management of diabetes are the responsibility of the whole of society,
 - (iii) parliaments should play a leading role in promoting community education and implementing effective policies and health care for sufferers of this worldwide scourge,
 - (iv) left undiagnosed and untreated, diabetes dramatically affects quality of life and shortens lifespan and its malevolent course inevitably leads to many serious associated health complications, including heart disease, stroke, renal failure, limb amputation and blindness, and
 - (v) unless national governments act to deliver comprehensive policies, the implications for health budgets will be calamitous; and
- (d) calls on the Government to:
 - (i) continue to make diabetes a national health priority,
 - (ii) commission a report by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare into the health costs of diabetes,
 - (iii) adequately fund best-practice medicine for the treatment of diabetes, and
 - (iv) continue to promote healthy lifestyle programs, especially targeted to children and young people.
- *279 Chair of the Rural and Regional Affairs and Transport Committee (Senator Sterle): To move—That the time for the presentation of the report of the Rural and Regional Affairs and Transport Committee on natural resource management and conservation challenges be extended to 12 March 2009.

*280 Leader of the Family First Party (Senator Fielding): To move—

- (1) That a select committee, to be known as the Select Committee on the Integrity of the Prime Minister's Office, be established to inquire into and report by 3 December 2008 on:
 - (a) the reported leak of the telephone conversation between the Prime Minister of Australia and the President of the United States of America on 10 October 2008;

- (b) the role and any involvement of the Prime Minister's office in relation to the leak;
- (c) the role and any involvement of the 'Note Taker', who was with the Prime Minister listening in on the telephone conversation, and any other person present or listening (if any) in regards to the leak;
- (d) the role and any involvement of any of the persons, present at the location where and when the telephone conversation was made, in regards to the leak;
- (e) the role of any ministerial staffer or public servant in regards to the leak:
- (f) the role of any member of the media in regards to the leak;
- (g) why the Australian Federal Police have not been asked to investigate the leak, especially if it is the view the conversation was leaked by either a ministerial staffer or public servant without the authority of the Prime Minister;
- (h) the reported complaint by the United States Ambassador about the leak;
- (i) the impact of the leak on undermining Australia's reputation and trustworthiness of the Prime Minister's office; and
- (j) the ongoing consequences of the leak for relationships between Australia and the United States and any other country.
- (2) That the committee consist of 8 members, 3 nominated by the Leader of the Government in the Senate, 3 nominated by the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate, 1 nominated by the Leader of Family First in the Senate and 1 nominated by any other minority party or independent senator.
- (3) (a) On the nominations of the Leader of the Government in the Senate, the Leader of the Opposition in the Senate and any minority party and independent senators, participating members may be appointed to the committee;
 - (b) participating members may participate in hearings of evidence and deliberations of the committee, and have all the rights of members of committee, but may not vote on any questions before the committee; and
 - (c) a participating member shall be taken to be a member of the committee for the purpose of forming a quorum of the committee if a majority of members of the committee is not present.
- (4) That the committee may proceed to the dispatch of business notwithstanding that not all members have been duly nominated and appointed and notwithstanding any vacancy.
- (5) That the committee elect a Government member as its chair.
- (6) That the chair of the committee may, from time to time, appoint another member of the committee to be the deputy chair of the committee, and that the member so appointed act as chair of the committee at any time when there is no chair or the chair is not present at a meeting of the committee.
- (7) That, in the event of an equally divided vote, the chair, or the deputy chair when acting as chair, have a casting vote.
- (8) That the quorum of the committee be 5 members.

- (9) That the committee have power to send for and examine persons and documents, to move from place to place, to sit in public or in private, notwithstanding any prorogation of the Parliament or dissolution of the House of Representatives, and have leave to report from time to time its proceedings and the evidence taken and interim recommendations.
- (10) In exercising its power in accordance with paragraph (8), for the avoidance of doubt, the committee is empowered to send for:
 - (a) ministers and ministerial advisers; and
 - (b) officers of the security and police services.
- (11) That the committee be provided with all necessary staff, facilities and resources and be empowered to appoint persons with specialist knowledge for the purposes of the committee with the approval of the President.
- (12) That the committee be empowered to print from day to day such documents and evidence as may be ordered by it, and a daily Hansard be published of such proceedings as take place in public.

*281 **Senator Siewert:** To move—That the Senate—

- (a) notes that:
 - 14 November is World Diabetes Day which in 2008 is focusing on children and adolescents particularly,
 - (ii) there are currently 250 million people worldwide who are living with diabetes,
 - (iii) in Australia an estimated 1.5 million people have the disease,
 - (iv) people with diabetes are at an increased risk of cardiovascular disease, foot complications, blindness, dental problems, kidney failure and amputations,
 - (v) 2 per cent of all Australian deaths are due to diabetes,
 - (vi) Indigenous Australians are three times more likely to suffer from diabetes that non-Indigenous Australians,
 - (vii) 8 per cent of all Indigenous Australian deaths are due to diabetes, and
 - (viii) the relatively low use of the National Diabetes Services Scheme by Indigenous patients; and
- (b) calls on the Government to continue:
 - (i) its efforts to ensure that people in regional, rural and remote communities have adequate access to the National Diabetes Services Scheme, and
 - (ii) to explore means through which the access of Indigenous people to the National Diabetes Services Scheme can be improved.

- 768 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister representing the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and the Arts—In regard to condition 26 and modules B and C of the Environmental Impact Management Plan for the Gunns Limited pulp mill in Tasmania:
 - (1) What is 'zero tolerance' and how will it be achieved.
 - (2) How and within what area/locale will existing threatened and endangered species populations be recorded, documented and compared against the construction impact of the pulp mill.
 - (3) What is the radius in kilometres from the mill site for 'zero tolerance'.
 - (4) Does 'zero tolerance' extend to construction crew traffic including, but not limited to, four-wheel drive and private vehicles.
 - (5) Is the 'zero tolerance' assessment self-regulating.
 - (6) If road kill is found and it is a threatened or endangered species, are there any mitigation mechanisms in place; if so, what.
 - (7) Taking into consideration those employees that will come from interstate, overseas and Tasmania: how will all employees recognise a threatened or endangered species.
 - (8) (a) How is compliance and non-compliance to be monitored and reported; and (b) what penalties are in place for non-compliance in regard to threatened and endangered species.

- (9) Considering that Gunns Limited did not complete the road kill module B, (condition 26) as directed by the Chief Scientist Dr Jim Peacock, has the Minister lowered the bar with implementing 'zero tolerance' and abandoned the Government's commitment to a 'most rigorous' assessment process.
- (10) Does the Government's current threatened and endangered species assessment process satisfy the intent of the Chief Scientist.
- (11) Given that apparently only one study has been performed and acknowledged at Low Head near the pipeline outfall, and given that the Minister for Climate Change and Water has assured Parliament that research identifying habitat/population locations of the threatened green and gold frog have been performed along the proposed pipeline route: where, when and who performed the other studies.
- (12) What measures are in place for newly identified green and gold frog populations if they are found near the pulp mill site or associated infrastructure (i.e. pipeline).

- (1) Has the Papua New Guinean Government accepted the Australian Government's initial \$3 million contribution to the Papua New Guinea-Australia Forest Carbon Partnership.
- (2) Has the Australian Government received any correspondence from the Papua New Guinean Government that indicates their intention to refuse Australia's \$3 million contribution; if so, what is the basis and/or reason for the refusal.

- (3) Are the Forest Carbon partnerships with Indonesia and Papua New Guinea conditional upon the implementation of Australia's National Carbon Accounting System.
- (4) Is the Clinton Foundation partnership contingent on the implementation of the National Carbon Accounting System in Indonesia and Papua New Guinea.
- 772 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister representing the Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry—
 - (1) What is the estimated volume of illegally-harvested sawn timber and timber products imported to Australia from Papua New Guinea and Indonesia.
 - (2) What is the estimated volume of illegally-harvested Papua New Guinean and Indonesian sawn timber and timber products imported to Australia from China.
 - (3) What is the estimated volume of plywood manufactured from illegally-harvested timber imported to Australia.
 - (4) What is the estimated loss in revenue to the Australian Government of illegally-harvested imported timber by product type.
 - (5) What are the social impacts of illegal logging operations.
- 773 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister representing the Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry—
 - (1) Has the department or any of its agencies carried out work since 2004 on the: (a) carbon sequestration potential of Kyoto-compliant plantations or native forest restoration; (b) effect of emissions trading (or a carbon tax) on existing Kyoto-compliant plantations, in respect of rotation lengths and their use for wood production; (c) relationship between carbon price and the rate and extent of plantation establishment and native forest restoration if these activities are included in the Government's Carbon Pollution Reduction Scheme; (d) impact of tax deductions for carbon sinks and/or managed investment schemes on the rate and extent of plantation establishment and native forest restoration; (e) impact on wood production from native forests as a result of including Kyoto-compliant plantations in the Carbon Pollution Reduction Scheme.
 - (2) (a) Can a list be provided of all projects, consultancies, publications or other work relating to question (1) above, giving the title, authors, date, cost (if a consultancy) and a brief summary; and (b) can a copy of each report, publication or document be provided.
- 774 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister representing the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and the Arts—
 - (1) Further to the answer to question on notice no. 558 (Senate *Hansard*, 27 August 2008, p. 3 975), concerning the Gunns Limited pipeline and populations of the green and gold frog, the department's response indicated that the frog survey has been conducted and completed: can the Minister now confirm the presence of green and gold frogs (*Litoria raniformis*) in the Dilston and Windermere areas.
 - (2) (a) Has the green and gold frog survey been completed to the Minister's satisfaction as directed by the Chief Scientist; and (b) what were the dates, locality and times of the surveys, and who conducted each one.

- (3) In the absence of data, can the Minister confirm that the Dilston, Windermere, Hillwood and Landfall areas will be suitably surveyed for the presence of the green and gold frog.

- 775 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister representing the Minister for Resources and Energy—In regard to the proposed HRL Limited coal-fired power station in Victoria's Latrobe Valley:
 - (1) Given the Government has committed \$100 million under the Federal Low Emissions Technology Demonstration Fund to HRL Limited for use towards the proposed 'clean coal' power plant in Gippsland: (a) are there any performance benchmarks/conditions on which this grant is contingent in regard to development timelines and technical performance of the facility; if so, what are they; and (b) are these conditions and/or benchmarks explained in government documents; if so: (i) what are the document titles, and (ii) are these documents publicly available; if not, will they become publicly available.
 - (2) Has this grant already been provided to HRL Limited.
 - (3) Have any contracts been signed with HRL Limited.
 - (4) If no contracts have been signed with HRL Limited: will any contracts be entered into with HRL Limited in relation to the \$100 million grant; if so, what is the expected timeline for contractual sign-off.
 - (5) Apart from the project description as provided in media releases, does the Government have any documentation which contains a more detailed project description; if so, can copies be provided of the documentation and/or the titles.
 - (6) Will the project replace any current coal-fired generation or will it be additional.
 - (7) Will the plant result in a rise in Australia's greenhouse gas emissions.
 - (8) Where will the project be sited.
 - (9) Has community consultation begun in relation to the location of the project; if so, can any relevant process information be provided.
 - (10) How much water will the plant use each year.
 - (11) (a) What is the estimated water use per megawatt hour and how does such usage compare with existing brown coal generators in the Latrobe Valley; (b) where will this water come from; and (c) will market rates be paid for this water.
 - (12) Given that the proponents claim that the project will be 30 per cent less polluting than an equivalent-sized conventional brown coal power station and use 50 per cent less water: will meeting these performance levels be a condition of receiving the \$100 million grant from the Government.

- (13) (a) Where else is the Integrated Drying Gasification and Combined Cycle technology in use; and (b) is using this technology meeting the abovementioned performance improvements in relation to water use and pollution output.
- (14) Will the project be required to implement carbon capture and storage.

776 **Senator Milne:** To ask the Minister for Climate Change and Water—

 - (9) Given that many indigenous wild plant species such as citrus, mung bean, rice and sorghum possess unique attributes of drought tolerance to changing climatic conditions, disease and pest resistance to combat changes in climate, provide nutritional quality for a more healthy diet, and may contain valuable new genes, what is the optimal use and best market for such species.

9 Unauthorised disclosure of committee proceedings

That the following order operate as an order of continuing effect:

- (1) The Senate confirms that any disclosure of evidence or documents submitted to a committee, of documents prepared by a committee, or of deliberations of a committee, without the approval of the committee or of the Senate, may be treated by the Senate as a contempt.
- (2) The Senate reaffirms its resolution of 20 June 1996, relating to procedures to be followed by committees in cases of unauthorised disclosure of committee proceedings.
- (3) The Senate provides the following guidelines to be observed by committees in applying that resolution, and declares that the Senate will observe the guidelines in determining whether to refer a matter to the Committee of Privileges:
 - Unless there are particular circumstances involving actual or potential substantial interference with the work of a committee or of the Senate, the following kinds of unauthorised disclosure should not be raised as matters of privilege:
 - (a) disclosure of a committee report in the time between the substantial conclusion of the committee's deliberations on the report and its presentation to the Senate;

- (b) disclosure of other documents prepared by a committee and not published by the committee, where the committee would have published them, or could appropriately have published them, in any event, or where they contain only research or publicly-available material, or where their disclosure is otherwise inconsequential;
- (c) disclosure of documents and evidence submitted to a committee and not published by the committee, where the committee would have published them, or could appropriately have published them, in any event;
- (d) disclosure of private deliberations of a committee where the freedom of the committee to deliberate is unlikely to be significantly affected.
- 2. The following kinds of unauthorised disclosure are those for which the contempt jurisdiction of the Senate should primarily be reserved, and which should therefore be raised as matters of privilege:
 - (a) disclosure of documents or evidence submitted to a committee where the committee has deliberately decided to treat the documents or evidence as in camera material, for the protection of witnesses or others, or because disclosure would otherwise be harmful to the public interest;
 - (b) disclosure of documents prepared by a committee where that involves disclosure of material of the kind specified in paragraph (a);
 - (c) disclosure of private deliberations of a committee where that involves disclosure of that kind of material, or significantly impedes the committee's freedom to deliberate.
- 3. An unauthorised disclosure not falling into the categories in guidelines 1 and 2 should not be raised as a matter of privilege unless it involves actual or potential substantial interference with the work of a committee or of the Senate.
- 4. When considering any unauthorised disclosure of material in the possession of a committee, the committee should consider whether there was any substantive reason for not publishing that material.
- (4) Before deciding to raise a matter of privilege involving possible unauthorised disclosure of committee proceedings, any committee may seek the guidance of the Committee of Privileges as to whether a matter should be pursued. If the committee decides that such a matter should be raised, it must consult with the Committee of Privileges before taking the matter further.
- (5) When applying this resolution a committee shall have regard to the matters set out in paragraphs 3.43 to 3.59 of the 122nd Report of the Committee of Privileges, June 2005.

(Sessional order agreed to on 6 October 2005 adopted as an order of continuing effect on 17 September 2007.)

GUIDE TO THE NOTICE PAPER

The *Notice Paper* is issued each sitting day and contains details of current business before the Senate. Its structure is based on four main types of business, as follows:

Matters of privilege take precedence over all other business and are listed at the beginning of the *Notice Paper* when they arise. They consist of notices of motion which the President has determined warrant such precedence and any orders relating to adjourned debates on such motions.

Business of the Senate has precedence over government and general business for the day on which it is listed. It includes disallowance motions, orders of the day for the presentation of committee reports, motions to refer matters to standing committees, motions for leave of absence for a senator and motions concerning the qualification of a senator

Government business is business initiated by a minister including the consideration of government legislation. It takes precedence over general business except for a period of 2½ hours each week set aside on Thursdays for general business.

General business is all other business initiated by senators who are not ministers. It takes precedence over government business only as described above.

Within each of these categories, business consists of notices of motion and orders of the day:

Notices of motion are statements that senators intend to move particular motions on the days indicated. They are entered on the *Notice Paper* in the order given and may be given jointly by two or more senators. Notices of motion are usually considered before orders of the day.

Orders of the day are items of business which the Senate has ordered to be considered on particular days, usually arising from adjourned debates on matters (including legislation) or requirements to present committee reports.

On days other than Thursdays, the *Notice Paper* records all business of the Senate and government business items, but includes only new items of general business from the previous sitting day. On Thursdays, business relating to the consideration of government documents, committee reports and government responses to committee reports is also published.

Other sections in the *Notice Paper* are as follows:

Orders of the day relating to committee reports and government responses—adjourned debates on motions to consider or adopt committee reports and government responses. These orders may be considered for one hour on Thursdays at the conclusion of general business. New items appear on the following day's *Notice Paper*. The section is printed in full on Thursdays.

Orders of the day relating to government documents—adjourned debates on motions to take note of government documents. Such orders arise from consideration of the government documents presented on a particular day and include consideration of any documents not reached on the day. They are also listed for consideration for up to one hour on Thursdays during the consideration of general business. New items appear in the following day's *Notice Paper*. The section is printed in full on Thursdays.

Business for future consideration lists any notice of motion or order of the day to be considered on a specific day in the future; for example, a committee report ordered to be presented on a specific date, or a notice of motion given for a day other than the next day of sitting.

Bills referred to committees lists all bills or provisions of bills currently being considered by committees.

Questions on notice includes the text of new questions on notice and lists the numbers of unanswered questions.

Orders of the Senate includes orders of short-term duration such as orders for production of documents and those relating to days of sitting for a period of sittings.

Contingent notices of motion are statements of intention by senators that, contingent on a specified occurrence, they may move a motion, usually to suspend standing orders. They are grouped by subject.

Temporary chairs of committees is a daily list of all senators appointed to take the chair in the absence of the President or Deputy President.

Categories of committees is a daily list, categorised by type, of Senate and joint committees. Details of each committee appear in the committee section.

Committees lists all of Senate and joint committees, including membership, current inquiries and reports presented on or since the previous sitting day.

Senate appointments to statutory authorities lists the statutory authorities on which the Senate is represented and details of representation.

Ministerial representation lists Senate ministers and the portfolios they represent.

The 'full' Notice Paper

On the first day of the autumn and spring sittings a full *Notice Paper* is printed listing all outstanding business before the Senate, including the full text of all unresolved notices of motion and unanswered questions on notice. This edition is a complete reference to unresolved business from earlier in the session and is useful to keep. All business before the Senate is published daily in the full online version of the *Notice Paper*, available on ParlInfo and at: www.aph.gov.au/senate/work/notice/index.htm
