I am a small retailer (Edens Landing News) in Queensland. Tobacco is one of our core products we sell and the plan to have them in Plain Packaging is not going to deter, prevent one person from using the product.

It has not worked anywhere in the world.

If the product is not on display what purpose does it serve other than to frustrate staff and customers with time delay while trying to determine which product is required.

Plain packaging will increase counterfeiting and make it easier to counterfiet

It is a gross invasion of peoples rights to be forced to plain packaging. Users of the products are 18 or older therefore considered adult, therefore they know the consequences of smoking to their health and environment, why should they have their choices of using a totally legal product seriously reduced.
