1. Please provide your thoughts on future funding of regional programs in order to invest in genuine and accountable community infrastructure projects.

Funding in Regional locations is dependent upon local knowledge of the community. Submissions should reflect a 'whole of community' approach thus ensuring communities grow within a planned manner, building upon the strengths they have. Funding should not be undertaken in an *ad hoc* manner. Sometimes the funding in a rural community is meant to be spread so far that little is really achieved – a focus on one area or initiative [such as parenting or vocational education] may be of greater benefit than several smaller applications ~ some experience here has been too little to do too much.

2. How should the Federal Government design regional programs in a way to minimise administrative costs and duplication for taxpayers.

Design of regional programs should be continuous and ongoing. It is critical that there be public disclosure/education of the funding existence; guidelines for potential applicants; examples of successful applications expressly for the purpose of educating the community.

he employment of an officer within our region has greatly facilitated community access and knowledge - I am uncertain who funds this position; but it is of great benefit.

3. Examine the former government's practices and grants outlined in the Australian National Audit Office report on Regional Partnerships http://www.anao.gov.au/director/publications/auditreports/2007-2008.cfm?item_id=40BC1C6C1560A6E8AAA43AAB96708E61 with the aim of providing advice on future funding of regional programs.

Were there universal education/information within the public domain about the grants and process of applying there may be less reason for criticism of the location of successful submissions.

4. Examine the former government's practices and grants in the Regional Partnerships Program after the audit period of 2003-2006 with the aim of providing advice on future funding of regional programs.
