It is may belief that that the previous funding available through the Regional Partnerships Program was genuine and accountable. It was an excellent opportunity for modern community infrastructure to be developed and allowing services and facilities not traditional available in the regions closing the gap between our city cousins.

How should the Federal Government design regional programs in a way to minimise administrative costs and duplication for taxpayers.

Regional programs should be designed at a federal level with on ground support available within the regions so an understanding of regions needs is established. A direct link with local officers and the federal government would minimise costs and duplication. State government does not need to be involved. One would assume that removing a workable program all in existence and recreating a similar program would create additional and unnecessary costs and duplication for taxpayers.

Findings in 2003 should have been addressed there and then, learnt from and practices put in place to ensure similar issues to do not reoccur. There is not enough evidence to justify the decision to pull the Regional Partnerships Program. This poor decision has not had adequate foresight and will result in delayed growth and development within the regions whilst the new program is implemented.

Examine the former government's practices and grants in the Regional Partnerships Program after the audit period of 2003-2006 with the aim of providing advice on future funding of regional programs.
