The Deputy Commissioner, Operations undertook to provide a map of liaison posts and numbers of people at each post as well as a map and numbers for all International Deployment Group staff located worldwide.

As at 3 May 2010, the Australian Federal Police (AFP) International Network has thirty-three posts.
