1 **A Bill for an Act to establish a Committee to invite**
2 **and consider nominations for appointment as**
3 **President of the Commonwealth of Australia, and**
4 **for related purposes**

5 The Parliament of Australia enacts:

6 **Part 1—Introduction**
7

8 **1 Short title**

9 This Act may be cited as the *Presidential Nominations Committee*
10 *Act 1999*.

Section 2

1 **2 Commencement**

2 This Act commences on the day on which it receives the Royal
3 Assent.

4 **3 Definitions**

5 In this Act:

6 **Commonwealth member** means a member of a Presidential
7 Nominations Committee who is appointed under section 9.

8 **community member** means a member of a Presidential
9 Nominations Committee who is appointed under section 11.

10 **Convenor** of a Presidential Nominations Committee means the
11 member of the Committee who is appointed as the Convenor of the
12 Committee under section 12.

13 **member** of a Presidential Nominations Committee includes the
14 Convenor of the Committee.

15 **President** means President of the Commonwealth of Australia.

16 **Presidential Nominations Committee** means a Committee
17 established under this Act.

18 **State/Territory member** means a member of a Presidential
19 Nominations Committee who is appointed under section 10.

2 **Part 2—Establishment, functions and powers of**
3 **Presidential Nominations Committee**
4

5 **4 Establishment and cessation of Committee**

6 (1) A Presidential Nominations Committee is to be established in
7 accordance with this Act each time that it is necessary to choose a
8 person as President.

9 (2) A Presidential Nominations Committee is established when the
10 appointment of its 16th member comes into effect.

11 (3) A Presidential Nominations Committee ceases to exist when the
12 incoming President's term of office begins.

13 **5 Functions and powers**

14 (1) The functions of a Presidential Nominations Committee are as
15 follows:

- 16 (a) to invite nominations for appointment as President;
17 (b) to consider the nominations received;
18 (c) to give the Prime Minister a report on the nominations.

19 Note: Part 4 deals with nominations.

20 (2) A Presidential Nominations Committee has power to do all things
21 necessary or convenient to be done for or in connection with
22 performing its functions.

23 **6 Questions to be decided by vote**

24 (1) Questions to be decided by a Presidential Nominations Committee
25 must be decided by a majority of the votes cast by members of the
26 Committee present and voting.

27 (2) The Convenor may vote on all questions and also has a casting
28 vote.

1 **7 Procedures**

2 A Presidential Nominations Committee may determine its own
3 procedures.

Part 3—Membership of Presidential Nominations Committee

8 Committee members

A Presidential Nominations Committee has 32 members appointed by the Prime Minister by giving written notice to the appointee. The membership is as follows:

- (a) 8 Commonwealth members appointed under section 9;
- (b) 8 State/Territory members appointed under section 10;
- (c) 16 community members appointed under section 11.

9 Commonwealth members

- (1) The Prime Minister must appoint to a Presidential Nominations Committee 8 members of the Commonwealth Parliament. The 8 places are allocated on the basis of the representation of political parties in the Parliament, as follows.
- (2) Only political parties with at least 5 members of the Parliament are entitled to be allocated places.
- (3) Starting with the party or parties with the most members of the Parliament and ending with the party or parties with the fewest members (but no fewer than 5), one place is allocated to each of the parties in turn.
- (4) If there are places remaining to be allocated because there are fewer than 8 parties with at least 5 members of the Parliament, those places are allocated among the parties in the same way as the other places were allocated, except that only parties with at least 15 members of the Parliament are entitled to be allocated places under this subsection.
- (5) If 2 or more parties with equal numbers of members of the Parliament are entitled to a place or places, and there are not enough places for each of those parties to be allocated a place, the

1 remaining place or places must be allocated between them by
2 lottery.

3 (6) In filling each place that is allocated to a particular party, the Prime
4 Minister must appoint the member of the Parliament nominated by
5 that party's leader in the Parliament.

6 **10 State/Territory members**

7 The Prime Minister must appoint to a Presidential Nominations
8 Committee:

- 9 (a) one member of the Parliament of each State who is
10 nominated by that Parliament; and
11 (b) one member of the Legislative Assembly for the Australian
12 Capital Territory who is nominated by that Assembly; and
13 (c) one member of the Legislative Assembly of the Northern
14 Territory who is nominated by that Assembly.

15 **11 Community members**

16 The Prime Minister must appoint to a Presidential Nominations
17 Committee 16 persons who are not members of the
18 Commonwealth Parliament or the Parliament or legislature of a
19 State or Territory.

20 **12 Convenor of Committee**

21 The Prime Minister must appoint one of the members of a
22 Presidential Nominations Committee as the Convenor of the
23 Committee.

24 **13 Duration of membership**

- 25 (1) A person appointed as a member of a Presidential Nominations
26 Committee becomes a member at the time specified by the Prime
27 Minister in the notice of appointment.
28 (2) All members of a Presidential Nominations Committee cease to be
29 members when the incoming President's term of office begins.

1 **14 Other terms and conditions**

- 2 (1) A member of a Presidential Nominations Committee holds office
3 on a part-time basis.
- 4 (2) A member of a Presidential Nominations Committee is to be paid
5 the allowances that are prescribed.
- 6 (3) A community member of a Presidential Nominations Committee is
7 to be paid the remuneration that is determined by the
8 Remuneration Tribunal. If no determination of that remuneration
9 by the Tribunal is in operation, the member is to be paid the
10 remuneration that is prescribed.
- 11 (4) Subsections (2) and (3) have effect subject to the *Remuneration*
12 *Tribunal Act 1973*.
- 13 (5) A member of a Presidential Nominations Committee holds office
14 on the terms and conditions (if any), in relation to matters not
15 covered by this Act, that are determined by the Prime Minister.

16 **15 Resignation and termination of membership**

- 17 (1) A member of a Presidential Nominations Committee may resign
18 by giving the Prime Minister a written resignation.
- 19 (2) If a member of a Presidential Nominations Committee is
20 nominated for appointment as President (see Part 4), the person
21 ceases to be a member of the Committee when the Committee
22 receives the nomination.

23 **16 Replacement appointments**

- 24 (1) If a vacancy in the membership of a Presidential Nominations
25 Committee arises, the Prime Minister may appoint a person to fill
26 the vacancy.
- 27 (2) If the vacancy is for a Commonwealth member for a particular
28 political party, the person appointed must be the member of the
29 Commonwealth Parliament nominated by the party's leader in the
30 Parliament.

Section 17

- 1 (3) If the vacancy is for a State/Territory member, the person
2 appointed must be the member of the relevant State's Parliament,
3 or the relevant Territory's Legislative Assembly, nominated by the
4 Premier of that State or Chief Minister of that Territory.
- 5 (4) For the purposes of this Act, a person appointed under this section
6 is taken to have been appointed under whichever of sections 9, 10
7 and 11 is relevant.

8 **17 Effect of vacancies**

- 9 (1) Subject to subsection (2), a vacancy or vacancies in the
10 membership of a Presidential Nominations Committee does not
11 affect the performance of the functions or the exercise of the
12 powers of the Committee.
- 13 (2) A Presidential Nominations Committee may only perform
14 functions or exercise powers if there are at least 16 members, at
15 least 8 of whom are community members.

Part 4—Nominations2
3**18 Inviting nominations**

5 As soon as practicable after a Presidential Nominations Committee
6 is established, the Committee must invite the public to make
7 nominations for appointment as President.

19 Nominations from Australian citizens

9 Any Australian citizen or group of citizens may nominate a person
10 for President.

20 Content and form of nomination

12 A nomination must be in writing in the form determined by the
13 Presidential Nominations Committee and must be accompanied
14 by:
15 (a) the nominee's written consent to being nominated; and
16 (b) a written statement in support of the nomination, including a
17 statement indicating whether the nominee is qualified to be
18 chosen as President; and
19 (c) any other information or material required by the Committee.

21 Withdrawal of nomination

21 A person or group that has made a nomination, or the nominee
22 who consented to it, may withdraw the nomination at any time by
23 giving the Presidential Nominations Committee a written
24 withdrawal.

22 Committee's report

26 (1) The Presidential Nominations Committee must give to the Prime
27 Minister a written report on the nominations received.

Part 4 Nominations

Section 22

- 1 (2) The report must include a short list of nominees whom the
2 Committee considers to be the most suitable candidates to be
3 appointed as President.
- 4 (3) In considering the nominations received and preparing the report,
5 the Committee must consider:
6 (a) the diversity of the Australian community; and
7 (b) the ability of the nominees to command the respect and
8 support of the Australian community.
- 9 (4) The Committee may consider any other matter that it considers
10 relevant to the suitability of the nominees for appointment as
11 President and may have regard to any material it considers
12 appropriate. However, the Committee is not required to give any
13 person an opportunity to be heard on any matter.

Part 5—Confidentiality2
3**23 Application and definitions**

4

(1) This Part applies to the following persons (*entrusted persons*):

(a) persons who are or have been members of a Presidential Nominations Committee;

(b) persons who are or have been staff members assisting a Presidential Nominations Committee.

(2) In this Part:

court includes any tribunal, authority or person having the power to require the production of documents or the answering of questions.

disclose means divulge or communicate.

24 Protection of confidentiality of nominations

16

(1) This section restricts what entrusted persons may do with information relating to nominations received by a Presidential Nominations Committee. It applies:

17

(a) even if a nomination has been withdrawn; and

20

(b) even after the incoming President has been appointed.

21

(2) An entrusted person must not make a record of, or disclose, the identity of, or information that might tend to identify, a person who has been nominated for President and whose nomination the Committee has received, unless:

(a) the nominee has given written consent to the recording or disclosure; or

25

(b) the recording or disclosure happens in the course of the performance of the duties of the entrusted person as a member of the Committee or the Committee's staff.

(3) An entrusted person is not to be required to:

- 1 (a) produce to a court any record that identifies, or might tend to
2 identify, a person who has been nominated for President and
3 whose nomination the Committee has received; or
4 (b) disclose to a court the identity of, or information that might
5 tend to identify, such a person;
6 unless the nominee has given written consent to the production or
7 disclosure, or the production or disclosure is for the purposes of
8 proceedings in respect of a contravention of this Act or in respect
9 of the performance of functions, or exercise of powers, under this
10 Act.

11 **25 Protection of confidentiality of report**

- 12 (1) This section restricts the circumstances in which entrusted persons
13 may produce a section 22 report, or part of such a report. It applies
14 even after the incoming President has been appointed.
- 15 (2) An entrusted person must not produce to any person a section 22
16 report, or part of such a report, except in the course of the
17 performance of the duties of the entrusted person as a member of
18 the Committee or the Committee's staff.
- 19 (3) An entrusted person is not to be required to produce to a court a
20 section 22 report, or part of such a report, unless the production is
21 for the purposes of proceedings in respect of a contravention of
22 this Act or in respect of the performance of functions, or exercise
23 of powers, under this Act.

Part 6—Miscellaneous

26 Staff

A Presidential Nominations Committee may be assisted by a staff consisting of officers and employees of Departments of the Australian Public Service, and of Commonwealth authorities, whose services are made available to the Committee in connection with the performance of any of its functions.

27 Indemnity

A person is not subject to any liability to any person in respect of anything done, or omitted to be done, in good faith in the exercise or performance of powers, functions or duties under this Act.

28 Regulations

- (1) The President may make regulations prescribing matters:
- (a) required or permitted by this Act to be prescribed; or
 - (b) necessary or convenient for carrying out or giving effect to this Act.

- (2) However, before the commencement of Schedule 1 to the *Constitution Alteration (Establishment of Republic) 1999* on 1 January 2001, the Governor-General may instead make regulations prescribing those matters.
