### 1. Notes

- (a) the UN declared 17 October as the International Day for the Eradication of Poverty.
- (b) this year marks the 70th anniversary of the proclamation of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.
- (c) the fundamental connection between extreme poverty and human rights, and those living in poverty are disproportionately affected by rights violations.

### 2. Notes

- (a) the global commitment in pursuit of Sustainable Development Goal #1 to end poverty in all its forms everywhere and to recognise the dignity of the individual in the principle of leaving no one behind.
- (b) despite global poverty rates halving since 2000, one in ten people are still living below the international poverty line of US\$1.90 a day.

### 3. Acknowledges

- (a) poverty is more than the lack of income and resources, its manifestations include hunger and malnutrition, limited access to education and other basic services, social discrimination and exclusion.
- (b) the struggle of people living in poverty, hears their concerns and recognises that poor people are at the forefront of the fight against inequality.
- (c) building a sustainable future requires us to intensify our efforts towards ensuring that everyone can exercise their human rights and to fulfil the needs and aspirations of everyone – not just the privileged few – in this generation and those to come.

I give notice that on the next day of sitting, I shall move that the Senate—

- (a) notes that a recent Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change report on limiting global temperature increase by 1.5 per cent by 2050,
  - a. stated that ‘nuclear increases its share in most 1.5 degree pathways by 2050’
  - b. indicated in some projections that nuclear energy generation could expand by as much as 200 exajoules by 2100 – the equivalent of double the United States of America’s annual consumption,
  - c. estimated nuclear energy generation would increase by 2.5 times by 2050 in 85 mitigation scenarios;
  - d. the median uptake of primary energy supply via nuclear energy across the 85 mitigation scenarios between 2020 and 2050 was 7.22%, more than renewable energy (6.71%) and biomass (5.56%)
- (b) further notes that investigation of nuclear energy generation in Australia has been the subject of a legislative ban imposed at the behest of the Greens for almost 20 years; and
- (c) calls upon the Government to take steps to allow the consideration of nuclear energy generation in Australia’s energy mix.

(a) notes that:

- (i) On Wednesday July 11 2018, U.S. President Donald Trump told NATO leaders they should increase their defence spending to 4% of their country's economic output.
- (ii) The United States spent approximately 3.57% of its GDP on defence last year.
- (iii) Australia spent approximately 2% of its GDP on defence last year.
- (iv) We live in a volatile geo-political environment and Australia ought to have strong defence capabilities to defend the air-sea gap approach to our borders.
- (v) Historically during the 1950s and '60s Australia spent on average 3.3% of its GDP on defence.

(b) Calls on the Government to increase its defence spending to a target of 4% GDP to protect all Australians.

That the Senate—

1. Notes

- a. Since the last Senate sitting period, there have been 8 women killed by violence in Australia, bringing the total of women killed by violence to 55 in 2018, as reported by Counting Dead Women Australia from Destroy The Joint;
- b. On average, one woman a week is murdered by her current or former partner;
- c. 1 in 3 Australian women have experienced physical violence since the age of 15;
- d. 1 in 5 Australian women has experienced sexual violence;
- e. 1 in 6 Australian women has experienced physical or sexual violence by a current or former partner;
- f. 1 in 4 Australian women has experienced emotional abuse by a current or former partner;
- g. Australian women are nearly three times more likely than men to experience violence from an intimate partner;
- h. There is growing evidence that women with disabilities are more likely to experience violence;
- i. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women report experiencing violence in the previous 12 months at 3.1 times the rate of non-Indigenous women;
- j. In 2014–15, Indigenous women were 32 times as likely to be hospitalised due to family violence as non-Indigenous women.

2. Calls on the government to

- a. Recognise domestic violence against women as a national security crisis;
- b. Adequately fund frontline domestic violence and crisis housing services to ensure that all women seeking safety can access these services when and where they need them;
- c. Legislate for 10 days paid domestic violence leave so that women don't have to choose between paying the bills and seeking safety;
- d. Implement all 25 recommendations of the 2015 Senate inquiry into domestic violence in Australia.

## Notice of Motion (at the giving of notices)

I give notice that on the next day of sitting, I shall move—That the Senate:

1. Notes that:
  - a) The NSW Government is proposing to raise the Warragamba Dam wall by fourteen metres, which could inundate up to 4,700 hectares of national parks and 65 kilometres of wilderness streams and rivers, irreversibly damaging the integrity of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area (GBMWhA).
  - b) There are 25 threatened plant and animal species which inhabit the proposed inundation area, including the Camden White Gum, Kowmung Hakea and near-extinct honeyeaters.
  - c) There are alternatives for protecting the region from flooding and the community is sceptical that raising the dam wall is just a plan to allow a huge increase in inappropriate property developments on the floodplains of the Hawkesbury and Nepean Rivers.
2. Opposes the NSW Government's plans to raise the Warragamba Dam wall.
3. Calls on the Federal Environment Minister to block Federal approvals required to raise the Warragamba Dam Wall.

- a. Thursday October 11 was the internationally recognised Day of the Girl Child,
- b. Since its inception in 2011, the International Day of the Girl Child has;
  - i. Provided the international community with an opportunity to recognise and celebrate the power and potential of girls around the world, and
  - ii. Played a pivotal role in highlighting the barriers still faced by girls and women.
- c. The theme of this year's Day of the Girl Child was *With Her: A Skilled GirlForce*,
- d. According to UNICEF, young women aged 15-29 are more than three times as likely as young men to not be in employment, education or training,
- e. 131 million girls worldwide are out of school around the world, while completion rates and learning levels of girls are lower than those of boys,
- f. By 2030, at current rates more than half the world's girls will not be on track to achieve secondary level literacy and numeracy skills.
- g. Some countries lose more than \$1 billion a year by failing to educate girls to the same level as boys,
- h. 35 per cent of economically inactive young women leave work to have a baby or look after family,
- i. Girls who are married before the age of 18 see higher poverty rates than those who are married later,
- j. 15 per cent of East Asian and Pacific girls are married before the age of 18.

2) Recognises that young women's participation in education, training and work;

- a. Provides women with agency and opportunities, and
- b. Fosters economic growth and stability.

I give notice that on the next day of sitting, I shall move—that the Senate—

- (a) Notes my previous NOM on 19 June 2018 calling for the relocation of the Australian Embassy in Israel to Jerusalem in line with a similar action by the United States was opposed by the government which voted with Labor and the Greens to defeat the motion.
- (b) Notes the fact that the Wentworth by-election will occur next Saturday and that electorate has a large Jewish population.
- (c) Notes the sudden statement by the Prime Minister yesterday that the government is now supposedly considering relocating of the Australian Embassy in Israel to Jerusalem.
- (d) Expresses concern that these comments by the Prime Minister do not reflect a genuine intent by the government to re-locate the Australian Embassy but are instead a cynical ploy to win Liberal votes in a closely contested seat which the government has no intention of honouring.
- (e) Calls on the government to dispel these concerns by making a firm commitment right now that it will relocate the Australian Embassy in Israel to Jerusalem by March 2019.
