WHAT ARE LIONS?

COMMUNITY BENEFITS

A Lions Club was founded in Queanbeyan in 1957, and the first Canberra club in 1958. Since then the capacity of Lions to serve the community has continued to grow; last year their donations back to the community exceeded \$155,000. Lions service has reached every part of the community in Canberra, Queanbeyan and Bungendore; some major features of recent activities are:

- a hut for handicapped scouts at Camp Cottermouth;
- provision of special furniture for students at Cranleigh School;
- ongoing support for the Camp Quality program involving terminally ill children;
- purchase of special equipment for the District Nursing Service at Bungendore;
- "Identikid" a community child identification service;
- ongoing support for homeless youth through the LASA (Lions and Salvation Army) Centre at Waramanga;
- assistance to the Pegasus Riding School for the Disabled;
- fund-raising for Brindabella Gardens and Goodwin Retirement Villages in the ACT, and George Forbes House in Queanbeyan;
- financial support and work for individuals and smaller community groups.
