### Senator Claire Moore asked:

- 1. What is the expected saving over 10 years?
- 2. How many people will this affect?
- 3. What type of visas are they on?
- 4. Can you please break down the saving by each payment:
- Newstart Allowance;
- Youth Allowance;
- Austudy Payment;
- Carer Payments;
- Sickness Allowance;
- Special Benefit; and,
- Other payments.
- 5. What is the likely gender split based on past trends?
- 6. Does this measure place spouses in a more vulnerable position given the safety net has been withdrawn, especially new spouses in a new country?
- 7. There are differences between skilled and family migrants. Skilled migrants are seen as economic policy while family migration is a social program. This is the rationale for providing differences in NARWP. Has the Department undertaken any research to examine whether this change will have a negative impact on new migrants' settlement experiences? 8.
- 8. On their labour market participation? On their social welfare?
- 9. Have any stakeholders provided feedback to the Department on the proposed change?

#### **Answer:**

- 1. Estimated whole of government saving over the forward estimates is approximately \$225 million.
- 2. Approximately 5,700 people per year.
- 3. Primarily permanent partner visa holders and a small number of child visas.
- 4. Payment types
- Newstart Allowance: \$133.039 million save
  Youth Allowance: \$29.419 million save
- Austudy Payment: \$7.872 million save
- Carer Payments: \$20.713 million save
- Sickness Allowance: \$0.868 million save
- Special Benefit: \$55.613 million cost
- Other payments: \$84.6 million save

5. Based on Department of Immigration and Border Protection information:

Female: 76 per cent Male 24 per cent.

- 6. Family members would retain the exemption from the 104-week newly arrived resident's waiting period for Special Benefit if they have experienced both financial hardship and a substantial change in circumstances beyond their control after arrival in Australia. Family assistance payments may also be available if the person has a dependent child.
- 7. No.
- 8. For the purposes of estimating savings, the Department undertook analysis of previous cohorts that were granted social security payments via the family member exemption.
